

Lethers and Karasick Promise Hectic Grappling

LEG HOLD EXPERT FACES RUSSIAN ON CARD AT ARMORY

Sensational wrestling in big proportions will be handed out tonight at the armory, when Sam Lethers, Texas' limber-legged gift to the grunt and grimace game, tangles with Al Karasick, one of the most versatile and agile grapplers of the profession.

In one half of the double main event, the other match will rival the Lethers-Karasick fray in the manner its two contestants hurl each other out of the ring, as both George "Wildcat" Wilson, ex-all American football player, who boasts he will have no trouble, and Harry Demetral, Chicago's "Terrible Greek," have reputations for providing fans with their money's worth.

"The Boy" Billy Newman of Denver, as the third man in the ring, will have a busy evening in keeping the foursome of burly grapplers from tearing up rows of innocent spectators.

In a Klamath bout last week against Karasick, Wilson, one of football's greatest halfbacks, attempted to floor the Russian Lion with one of his gridiron flying tackles and came to 15 minutes later, after crashing through the ropes into ring-side seats.

Lethers, while seldom attempting a flying tackle, may come to the same grief by another route against the tricky Russian, unless he succeeds in clamping on one of his favorite rock-crusher leg holds.

ROGUES TO PLAY DOUBLE HEADER AT FAIRGROUNDS

A double header will be staged at the fairgrounds Sunday afternoon, according to Hal Haight, Rogue manager. The Gold Hill nine has been following in the footsteps of the Gilmore Lions in challenging the Rogues, with the result that Haight decided to take them both on the same afternoon, thereby giving the fans a double or bargain bill for the price of one.

The Gilmore-Rogue game will start at 1 o'clock and will go nine innings. Immediately following, the Gold Hill boys will take the field against the Rogues.

The Rogues are well supplied with pitchers, having Hughes, Spears, Sargent and Woodruff available for mound duty, with Hoosier Hoffard getting his arm in shape to step in, in case the others are humped too hard. Ivan Neathamer and George Harrington will be used behind the bat.

The Gilmore boys seem quite confident of taking the Rogues into camp and have several backers who have money to put on the line that they will do so. The Lions, to date, have defeated Jacksonville, Butte Falls, Prospect, Ashland, Eagle Point, Grants Pass second team, Crescent City and Hill. The only team able to take their measure was the Gold Hill outfit. The cement workers twice sent the Lions home with the short end of the game.

Haight stated that the games Sunday would probably be the last for the Rogues in Medford this year. He had planned on bringing the Sons of Italy team from Weed, champions of the California League, to Medford for a game, but the gate receipts for the past few weeks would not warrant such a game.

The Weed team took Ken Williams' Grants Pass champions for two games two weeks ago by the score of 5 to 1 and last Sunday 8 to 7. With Woodruff on the mound, Haight feels confident that the Rogues can beat the Italian champs and will probably play them in the California city.

DOG RACES KEEP FAIR GATES OPEN

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—(AP)—State Senator Allen A. Bynon declared last night that dog race revenue has enabled Oregon fairs to continue in spite of the last two years of "economic distress."

Senator Bynon presented the derby trophy last night at Multnomah stadium where 20,000 persons saw Fred Wheeling win the classic, paying his backers \$150, \$5.34 and \$4.18.

"When the racing bill was before the 1933 session of the legislature many men questioned whether racing would find support by our people," Bynon said.

The state fair, numerous county fairs and Pacific International Livestock exposition could not have continued without the extra revenue, Bynon said.

The dogs yielded the state \$61,000 last year and \$80,000 is anticipated this year.

LEWIS DISABLES MASKED MARVEL

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Ed (Strangler) Lewis made good on at least one of his promises here last night. He mauled, buffeted and thoroughly subdued the "masked marvel" in the headliner of a wrestling card.

Lewis had also threatened to make the marvel tell his name after the bout—but the marvel didn't wake up in time. After just 14 minutes and 37 seconds the marvel was out cold on the canvas and had to be carried to his dressing room. He was unable to come back for the second round.

Ray Steele, Glendale, Cal., used reverse body flips to defeat Mattra Karasick, Russia, in the semi-final. With a rolling head scissors, Rube Wright, Houston, Texas, threw Harry Johnson, San Jose, Cliff Olsen, Minneapolis, won the opener from Cliff Thiede, Los Angeles, with whip wristlocks.

HALF CENT ADDED TO BUTTER PRICES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—(AP)—A further advance of 1/2 cent a pound in the price of butter is being below extras was the answer of the Portland produce exchange to the complaints of consumers that values had been lifted too rapidly and too much. There was no change in extras on the exchange for the day and the standard score is but 1/2 cent a pound, which is considered too small a premium for quality during the heated period.

There was no further change announced in the price of butterfat but premiums were still being paid but more generally so today than last week.

Trade in eggs continued to reflect reasonable decrease.

Trade in eggs continued to strengthen here. The advance of 1c forced on the exchange was being generally followed but the resale price was erratic.
