

# TURKISH REPUBLIC FIRMLY STARTED TOWARD PROGRESS

### Mustafa Kemal Shows Leadership—Nation At Danger Point Economically—Fine Army Being Trained.

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ANKARA, Turkey.—(UP) The Turkish republic is firmly established and well on the road to progress, under the leadership of Ghazi Mustafa Kemal.

Economically, the nation, has, however, reached a danger zone. This is the conclusion at which the United Press staff correspondent arrived after a lengthy stay in the capital of the country.

**Push Home in Order**  
The nation wants and needs peace in order to put its house in order. Risky foreign entanglements are being carefully avoided; but the country is well prepared to repulse any attack.

The army, composed of sturdy peasants, who do one year and a half of compulsory service, is trained excellently and is well equipped. Politically, no sign of opposition is visible within the country.

The adherents of the sultanate and of the khilafate gradually are dying out. Most of the ghazi's former adherents, who remained in the country, have made their peace with the present regime.

Economically, the outlook is not quite so promising. The country is rich in natural resources.

**Last Census**  
According to the last census of 1927, it had a population of 13,648,600. A minister recently claimed it now had reached 18,000,000. This may be a slight exaggeration; but it is doubtless increasing. This is largely due to effective measures to reduce mother and infant mortality.

But ready capital for development of the natural resources is lacking. The money circulation is about 130,000,000 Turkish pounds. Without recurring to inflationary measures, it might, as Suleik Kaya, minister of the interior, said, be increased to 175,000,000. Even this figure would be very low for a population of about 15,000,000 or 16,000,000.

Much money which might have been used for vital constructive purposes has been invested in costly office palaces and showy apartment buildings.

Taxes are extremely high owing to the government's ambitious reconstruction program and to defense expenditure.

## HERB MOORE HAS DISASTROUS FIRE

ASHLAND, Aug. 24.—(Sp.)—Fire Thursday morning completely destroyed a garage, a Buick sedan, a delivery truck, woodshed, and the winter's supply of wood owned by Herb Moore, local deliveryman, at his home in Bellevue.

Three dogs, shut up for the night in the garage, perished in the flames.

Loss caused by the disaster will run to approximately \$3500, according to Moore's estimate. The property was partly covered by insurance.
