

# LEGION BULWARK AGAINST RADICAL MENACE IS URGED

Commander Hayes in Address at Oregon Conclave Calls On Citizens to Uphold Government, Liberty

ASTORIA, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Edward A. Hayes, American Legion national commander, today called on Legionnaires to form a bulwark of protection against "communistic menace" and "radical elements."

Addressing the Oregon department Legion convention which is devoting much attention to communism, the national commander, tall Decatur, Ill., attorney, called upon all citizens to uphold our government and preserve liberty.

Red Movement Seen.

The Legion is "not hunting a red" behind every bush," he said, but recognizes a "definite communistic movement in the United States, and

is making war upon the radical teachings that exist."

He called on the "men and women who fought to preserve our government" to make peace-time efforts against "radical elements which are teaching strange tenets and advocating a tearing down of those fundamental principles upon which our nation has progressed."

Strange Tenets Spreading.

"We cannot ignore the fact," he said, "that in our schools, in our colleges, in our churches, and our social organizations—even in government circles, strange tenets are spreading."

He told of student anti-war activities in a number of states and referred to what he called a subversive article published in the *Spokane Herald* and written by the secretary of the Methodist Federation of Social Service.

The article, he said, gave young Christians a suggestion that they could join the army in the event of war and commit sabotage. Hayes said the article suggested the youth could go further and join other youths in sabotage with a deliberate intent to get rid of the present economic system, or which war was declared a part.

Says Author Communist.

"We looked up the author of this article, this secretary of the Methodist Federation of Social Service, and found her listed in connection with communistic activities," Hayes declared.

Speaking of war benefit payments, Hayes declared veterans were placed in a class of handicap by service to their flag during the war and the Legion seeks "only to bring them to the level of those who did not serve in the great war."

The Legion is seeking enactment of a universal war time service measure which would embrace common responsibility for all citizens, capital and resources.

"It will be a guarantee of peace," he said, "because no man or group of men would seek to foster war in the hope of making plain money out of it."
