

STATE EMPLOYEE SALARY STUDIES SHOW VARIATION

With freshman week, the introduction to the regular fall term, only a month away, workmen are busily engaged in getting the Oregon State college campus and buildings ready for what is expected to be a somewhat larger number of students than were at the college last year. A crew of workers has been on the job most of the summer painting and making necessary repairs, the first on many of the buildings for several years.

E. B. Lemon, registrar of O. S. C., reports the heaviest correspondence from prospective students in four or five years. The preponderance of the requests for information ask about the possibilities of obtaining employment, he says. Many of the prospective students declare they will not be able to attend college this fall unless they have some financial assistance. Although the federal government, through the state emergency relief administration, will distribute nearly \$300,000 a month to needy students at the college, this and other agencies will be hard pressed to meet the great demand for student employment, Mr. Lemon believes.

Advance applications for admission to the college give every indication of a healthy increase in enrollment, the registrar reports, and the outlook is encouraging.

Freshman week, a period set aside for beginning students to become oriented and to have plenty of time to consult with their advisers, will begin Monday, September 24 and close the following Saturday. Sophomores, juniors and seniors will register Saturday, September 29 and regular class work will begin Monday, October 1.

STATE COLLEGE PREPARING FOR MORE STUDENTS

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—A committee appointed by Governor Meier today studied salaries of state employees.

The committee, consisting of Senator Henry L. Corbett, chairman; E. F. Mahaffey and Lynn S. McCready, hoped to be able to recommend an equitable schedule for standardization of salaries by October 1.

The group will consider vast differences in salaries of employees doing the same type of work. At present, employees in some state departments are paid much more than employees in other departments doing similar work.

State commissions, especially the game and fish commissions, pay considerably larger salaries among their employees than do other departments.

The state payroll approximates \$650,000 a month.

In starting the survey, the governor pointed out that he had long felt that serious inequalities had existed between the salary schedules of the various state departments.

"I believe a study of this kind would be extremely helpful in arriving at a more uniform and equitable basis of payment," the governor said.

An investigation will entail considerable study and research, ascertaining variances in pay among the different departments, committee members said.

The governor hopes to make use of the report in connection with preparation of the biennial budget.

Two years ago the same committee studied state salaries at the request of Governor Meier to recommend salary reductions, then necessary.

U. S. MUST DRAFT OWN RELIEF PLAN

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, returned today on the S. S. Washington from a survey of European relief measures, convinced that the United States must work out a relief program of its own.

"It was made clear to me that we must find an American way of meeting the hazards of the economic system," he said, "such as unemployment and old age insurance, rather than copy the schemes they have abroad."

"I think that some type of unemployment insurance, coupled with a permanent program of public works that would be non-competitive with private enterprise should be worked out."

CANADA TO KEEP FODDER SUPPLY

OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The Canadian government today forbade exportation of fodder except under licenses provided by the new marketing law.

The order for the regulation of exports by license was issued with surveys indicated the extent of the shortage of fodder crops in all parts of Canada. The activities of speculators also was said to have led to the decision.

The statement issued by the office of the prime minister estimated the hay and clover crop of Canada this year at only 9,804,000 tons, compared with an average of 15,000,000 tons for the four years from 1926 to 1930.

Death Preferable to Starvation
BOISE, Idaho (UP)—Rather than let antelope starve, the state game commission is going to allow hunters to kill some of them this fall. Between September 10 and 20, 150 hunters, residents of the state, who have paid \$10 for the privilege, will be allowed to hunt them in Butte, Custer, Clark, Jefferson, and Lemhi counties.

FIRE PERIL HALTS ALL WORK IN AREA

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(AP)—State Forester Lynn F. Cronmiller stated here this afternoon that the recent emergency order closing down all logging and milling operations north of Douglas county and west of the summit of the Cascade mountains, would include also the shutting down of all power driven machinery within the forest areas in that section.

Cronmiller said that much highway construction activity and also work in the CCC camps had been affected by the order.

The state forester was given the power to shut down any woods operations whenever existing fire hazards warranted the action, by act of the 1933 legislature.

CHEERY WORD FOR CATTLE RAISERS

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Oregon cattlemen may be cheered by word received by Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture, today from Washington, D. C., that Oregon's allotment for purchase of cattle on the tuberculosis and Bang's disease eradication program had been increased from \$38,000 to \$400,000.

The word was received from Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, who was sent east several weeks ago with instructions to remain until Oregon's share was boosted.

The \$400,000 will become available to farmers and cattlemen immediately under terms of the federal cattle purchase allotment.
