

PROBATION GIVEN YOUTHS WHO TOOK ROSENBAUM AUTO

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Loyal A. Prewitt, 18, of Newhall, and Carl A. Kahn, 18, of Castale, were placed on probation for three years each by Federal Judge Frank H. Kerrigan here today after they had pleaded guilty to charges of driving a stolen automobile from Medford, Ore., to San Francisco.

Oliver H. Goss, 35, of Sebastopol, who was arrested with the boys, was sentenced Thursday to 15 months in jail.

As part of the probation, Judge Kerrigan ordered the youths each to pay one-third of the cost of restoring the stolen automobile to its owner.

The automobile which the trio was charged with stealing, belonged to A. S. Rosenbaum, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific company here. The car was returned to Medford, sans radio and a spare tire.

Oliver H. Goss, mentioned above, is the same initial and name of a transient, who played a more or less minor role in the burglary committed by Victor L. A. Banks and E. H. Phil, a man by the name of Goss was head of the "Unemployed Council of Jackson County." There is no confirmation it is the same man.

ARGENTINE AIDE HERE TO SURVEY FRUIT INDUSTRY

Mr. Victor C. del Mazo, representative of the Argentine government, is making a survey of the fruit industry here, including packing houses and refrigeration.

He is making his headquarters at the Holland hotel where he has spent the last two weeks.

In commenting on his impressions of the West he claims to be delighted with the genuine hospitality and helpfulness that he has encountered here.

Particular mention, Mr. del Mazo says, should be made of the cordial treatment he has received at the hands of local packers. He has visited Pacific Fruit Brothers, S. O. S. Red Rosenberg Brothers, and others, and he marvels at the up-to-date equipment and high quality of the work performed by them in their plants.

Upon his return to the Argentine, Mr. del Mazo says that he will introduce quite a few innovations there and will carry out an American program among the fruit growers and packers there.

This year the Argentine will export to New York over half a million crates of grapes. They are in great demand in the east and in European countries.

Mr. del Mazo will leave shortly to study conditions in Yakima and Wenatchee, Washington.

COLBY HELD UPON CHARGES OF GIRL

J. Noel Colby, 33, of Grants Pass was arrested late Friday on a warrant charging a statutory offense involving a 14-year-old girl residing with her parents in Jacksonville, and his preliminary hearing was set for Wednesday, August 29. The offense is alleged to have occurred last June.

Colby is held in the county jail in lieu of bonds. Statements to the district attorney by the girl in the case and her 12-year-old brother allege that Colby induced the girl, with two other girls, to take an auto ride one evening last June. The attack is alleged to have taken place when the auto was parked near the Jacksonville cemetery when the other members of the party left to buy ice cream cones with money given them by Colby, the girl avers in her statement. The girl told her brother of the happening and the last told his father, the statements set forth.

Colby returned to Jacksonville recently and was recognized by the girl, whose parents reported to the authorities and his arrest followed. The girl's family came to this section a few months ago from Chicago, Ill.

HOME TELEVISION AS CHEAP AS RADIO INVENTOR HOPES

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Widespread use of television sets priced "so cheap the radio manufacturers would like it," is predicted for the next decade by Philo T. Farnsworth, young inventor claimant to the first radio picture of the moon.

For the present, the 28-year old scientist says, prohibitive costs will delay practical application of the electronic principle used in the astronomical photograph, but in ten years prices can be cut low enough to give the radio makers a headache.

Farnsworth said yesterday, after the first formal demonstration of his invention, that there is "no need for television to go along in the same buffet type of cabinet the radio has lived in."

DROUTH BENEFITS NORTHWEST GRAIN AND HAY PRICES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25.—(AP)—The Journal said today that spread of the drought to many lands probably will strengthen Pacific northwest hay and grain prices.

Canada's action in licensing export of hay and feedstuffs was looked upon as indication this country would not get supplies of moment from the dominion.

The Journal said there is better than a good chance for Pacific northwest hay to move by water to the eastern and gulf territory.

There is even a good chance of Pacific northwest hay going into European channels. Recent cables from the continent suggested need of imports.
