## ROWE, 22, EQUALS BASEBALL RECORD WINS OWN GAME

### Tigers Increase Lead Over Yankees, Who Break Even With Cleveland—White Sox Win Pair

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Schoolboy Rowe, Detroit giant pitching ace, today won his bid for his sixteenth consecutive victory, and baseball's hall of fame, by driving in the winning run for the Tigers' 4-to-3 victory over Washington in the ninth inning.

The victory for the 22-year-old right hander makes him the joint holder of the American league's record for consecutive games with Walter Johnson, Joe Wood and Lefty Grove.

Detroit also advanced further toward the flag today, extending its margin over New York to five full games.

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## BOSTON ENTRANT OUTSAILS RIVALS FOR CUP DEFENSE

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Harold Vanderbilt's yacht Rainbow today defeated Frederick Prince's Westamoe by the comfortable margin of four minutes and 26 seconds in the final trials to nominate a defender of the America's cup. This was the rivals' second meeting of the final trials and Rainbow's second victory.

It was not a very stirring exhibition as sailing contests go, for Vanderbilt won the engagement at the very start. The two yachts were tardy crossing the line, but Westamoe was by far the greater laggard. She was about a minute behind Rainbow and had almost been blanketed by her rival, was moving much slower. From then on it was a procession around the 30-mile triangle course with Westamoe never out of Rainbow's wake.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Yankee of Boston, the under dog, dark horse and virtually the unwanted stepchild when the trials began, remained today the leading contender for the honor of defending the America's cup, most prized of all yachting trophies.

Yankee's almost unbroken string of victories over her two rivals, Harold S. Vanderbilt's Rainbow and Frederick Prince's Westamoe, and her clean slide in the final trials now in progress have left the Boston boat's supporters with crossed fingers and knocking on wood.

Rainbow's after-guard still are convinced the newly built defense material but that she has had the good end of all the breaks of the game so far.

Westamoe, a smart and lively contender of the 1930 series, has proved a disappointment.

Charles Francis Adams has sailed Yankee to victory over both Rainbow and Westamoe in the final trials and she thus stands alone with a perfect record. Rainbow defeated Westamoe in the other race of the final trials.

Meanwhile Tom Sopwith and the British challenger, Endeavour, are going about the preparation for the cup races in an untruffled manner. Sopwith has not hesitated to take Endeavour out on the course with his prospective foes. Endeavour has proved as slippery as an eel and looms as the most dangerous challenger a cup defender ever has been called upon to face.

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## \$2.20 TOP PRICE TO SEE STATERS BIGGEST BATTLES

CORVALLIS, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Oregon State's football team will play four of its 11 games this fall before crowds paying a top price of \$2.20 for seats reserved seats, the graduate managers' office informed alumni of the institution.

These top prices will be paid for the Stanford and Oregon games in Portland, the Washington State game at Pullman and the Washington game in Seattle. The two games in Los Angeles, Southern California and U. C. L. A., have a top price schedule of \$1.50. Games with Willamette, Pacific, San Francisco University, Columbia and Montana, all to be played at Corvallis, will be at general admission prices only, ranging from 75 cents to \$1.10.

C., Junior Legion baseball team in refusing to compete against the Springfield, Mass., Junior league team because of the presence of a negro on the Springfield nine.

The post, composed entirely of negroes, drew a resolution which it will ask Massachusetts delegates to present to the national convention of the legion at Miami. It charges the baseball incident was a "natural reaction to the 'forty and eight' constitution, which also bars colored men," and asks that the request for membership in the legion, "or any of its inter-organizations shall be honorable war service in 1917 and continued and sustained 100 per cent Americanism ever after."
