



GILMORES BLANK ROGUES, 8 TO 0, IN SEASON'S CLIMAX

Tungate Hits Homer and Holds Leaguers to Three Hits—Scoring Started by George Smith in Fourth

When Medford's Gilmore Lions roared yesterday afternoon on the fairgrounds diamond, Hal Haight's Rogues' mouths resembled their score—nine big, round circles. Ray Tungate, for the Oilers, held Medford's big-time aggregation to three puny hits to shut them out, 8-0, in what was termed by fans as the fastest game of baseball played here this year.

A time after time the Rogues threatened, only to be smothered by brilliant Gilmore play. New talent added from coast league training camps could not pull the Rogues up to an equality with their young challengers, who had encountered difficulty in arranging the game "because they would neither draw a gate, nor furnish much competition."

Smith Starts Hitting. Niba Spears, college flash recently signed up by Haight for Rogues pitching, held the Pelinas under control for three frames, but in the fourth George Smith started off with a triple, followed by Dick Lewis, single, Tommy Kenton's triple and Bob Smith's single, scoring George Smith and Lewis. Bob Smith crossed the plate when second Sacker Reinking muffed Stoddard's hard drive, giving Gilmore a three-run lead. Another tally was added in the fifth when Dick Sakradia was safe on an error and came home on a sacrifice. Scoring then ceased until the ninth, when Stoddard and Hurst got aboard on hits to come home in a walk, when Ray Tungate drove out a homer to left field. George Smith scored the eighth and last tally after singling when Jim Tungate poked a hard double down the third base line.

Rogues Near Score. Medford's closest scoring threat came when Reinking, after accepting a walk, was caught in a hot box between third and home as Leftfielder Smith fumbled Spears' drive. Numerous Rogues efforts to steal bases were nipped by goodly margins, while the Lions pranced from base to base with almost laughable frequency.

SCHMELING WINS TECHNICAL KAYO AGAINST NEUSEL

Blond Teuton Unable to Answer Bell for Ninth Round After Terrific Beating—Max Coming to U. S.

HARBURG, Ger., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Undisputed kingpin of German heavyweights once more, Max Schmeling turned his attention today to the United States and the possibility of a world championship match with Max Baer.

The blond Teuton of the Rhine emerged from comparative flaccid obscurity yesterday to batter down Walter Neusel, blond Teuton youngster, in a savage bout fought before more than 100,000 spectators.

Schmeling's victory, gained on a technical knockout when Neusel failed to answer the bell for the ninth round, carried with it the German heavyweight title. Much more important was the effect it might have on Schmeling's chances of getting a shot at the world title.

Max Baer, coming to U. S. Schmeling plans to sail for the United States next month and undoubtedly will figure in negotiations designed to find an opponent for Baer's first title defense next summer.

Schmeling won the heavyweight championship on a foul from Jack Sharkey in 1930 and lost it by decision two years later. He was labeled as "through" by some experts after he had been stopped by Baer in ten rounds in 1933; outpointed by Steve Hamas and held to a draw by Paulino Uzcudim earlier this year.

Max fought a heady fight against Neusel, the youngster who had campaigned so successfully in the United States last year. He let Neusel do all the leading and then stepped in with stiff body counters that appalled the youngster's strength.

HUGE SILT SLIDE COVERS PART OF JEFFERSON PARK

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP)—A new canyon was cut, and an area 800 by 500 yards was covered with a sticky mass of glacial silt, mud, rocks and uprooted trees by the Moraine wash that sent tons of debris 1200 feet down the side of Mount Jefferson last Tuesday, an aerial survey of the district revealed Sunday afternoon.

With boulders as large as small houses bobbing in it like corks, the huge mass of semi-liquid debris tore out the lower side of the lake at the base of Whitewater Glacier and moved slowly and majestically down on Jefferson park, Dr. Paul Spangler, president of the famous Mazama Alpine club, reported.

One mountain stream was completely obliterated, 30-foot trees were in some cases almost entirely covered, and two Mazama camp sites were buried.

The exploration party reported that danger of a second avalanche carrying part of Whitewater glacier with it seems remote, though there are numerous other small glacial lakes which may "go out" at any time, due to concentrated erosion and the unusual amount of water released by snows melted in high temperatures.
