District Attorney Godding said if any criminal liability was shown charges would be filed.

Witnesses were questioned this morning and yesterday to determine if liquor was responsible. O. H. Cross-neau, auto salesman, who carried the injured auto to the hospital, was interviewed this morning. He was unable to state definitely whether or not Davis or other occupants of the car were intoxicated. He said he paid no particular attention, as his chief concern was driving the injured as quickly as possible to the hospital.

The accident occurred about 1:30 o'clock in the morning, at the sharp corner while en route to Medford from Jacksonville. Photographs of the wrecked car in the field adjoining the road, were taken yesterday, for use in the investigation by the authorities. It is held that Davis was traveling at too high a speed to make the turn.

The district attorney expects to interview the attending physicians and hospital attendants in an effort to disclose all the facts in the case.
