

# Golf Stars Will Have no Monopoly on Prizes in Coming Tourney

## PLAYERS WILL BE BRACKETED WITH EYE ON HANDICAP

### Trio of Portland Aces Enter — Much Interest to Center Around Contestants Who Shoot From 90 Up

The Southern Oregon-Northern California golf championship tournament committee announced today that entries were received this morning from Cecil Stevens, Russell Nance and Eddie Halseh, all from Portland. The first two mentioned carry 6 handicaps, while the other is rated at 8.

They are all prominently identified with golfing events in Portland and each has been the winner of many tournaments in that section.

Their participation further assures the higher brackets will be much faster than in previous years, when the tourney opens on the Rogue Valley course September 31.

Regardless of the fact that many low handicap men are entering, the real interest of the tournament is to be centered around those flights embracing players who shoot from 90 up.

The committee in charge emphasized today the fact that anyone entering, regardless of his game, will be bracketed with those shooting a similar score. This definitely assures each participant of an equal chance of winning a prize.

It is the desire of the club that this program be given special attention, for the reason that primarily the tournament is for all golfers and not for a few, fortunate or otherwise that happen to shoot low scores. Accordingly a special invitation is extended to all those with handicaps of 20 or more. Further, that all golfers of southern Oregon and northern California are invited to enter, regardless of any club affiliation.

Play over the course for the balance of the week will be free of any charge for those entering, thereby giving them an opportunity to familiarize themselves with actual playing conditions.

Owing to the large field this year the committee in charge of the actual play has not quite completed the final schedule of play and special events. It is expected this announcement will be forthcoming within a few days.

## GRID OFFICIALS' SCHOOL SLATED HERE SEPT. 13TH

O. C. Smith, acting city school superintendent, has accepted the position of director of the football officials' training school to be held in this city Sept. 13, in accordance with a motion passed at the last annual meeting of the Oregon High School Athletic Association at Portland. The motion provides for training schools to be held in 14 Oregon cities from Sept. 4 to Sept. 19, requiring that all officials for high school athletic contests be trained, examined, rated and registered, with the hope that the plan will result in a better class of athletic competition for Oregon high schools, starting this fall, and a more uniform interpretation of rules by virtue of the class instruction.

"Doug" Lowell, one of the outstanding football officials of the state, will be in charge of the instruction and examination work, and will arrive here Sept. 13 for the local school, to be held from 1 to 6 p. m. Mr. Smith, a member of the district committee, is in charge of arrangements, and will register officials as "certified," "A" grade; "approved," "B" grade; and "probationary," "C" grade.

A registration fee of \$1.00 will be made by candidates, payable to Director Smith before the class is held. Each candidate will fill out a registration blank giving information requested, attend the instruction class and take the written examination. Positions included in the tests will include, referee, head linesman and field judge. Rating of officials will be made by considering previous experience and the standing made in the written examination, with a different set of questions used at each training center of the state.

The registration fee will be used to pay expenses of the training school, and to print a book containing a list of all officials, to be given out Sept. 27 to members and to each Oregon high school, which will select its officials from the list.

Examinations will be held annually, allowing members to raise their rating, but the O. H. S. A. reserves the right to refund the registration fee and cancel an individual's membership for good cause. Membership cards will be mailed each candidate
