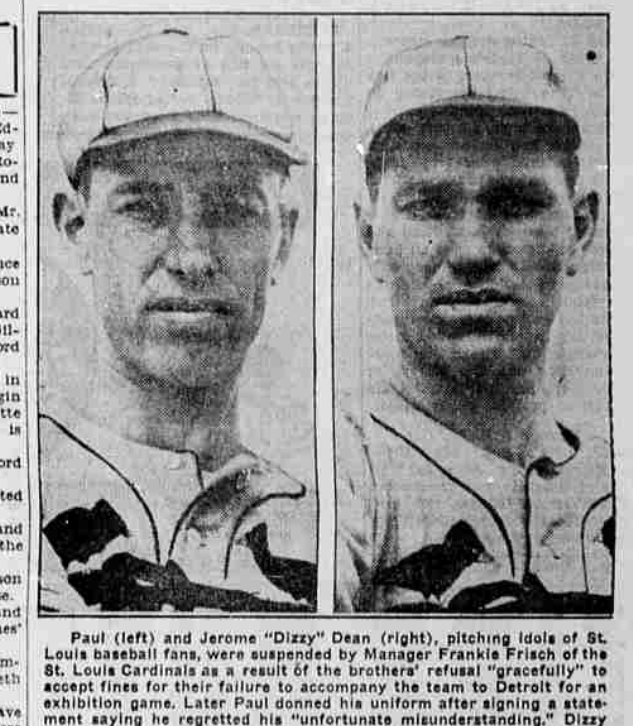

COAST AIR SERVICE FASTEST IN WORLD

The Pacific coast now boasts the fastest coastwise airplane service in the world, according to a bulletin of United Air Lines which points out that its planes now are flying the 462 miles between Medford and Spokane in four and two-thirds hours, including the stops at Portland, Tacoma and Seattle.

Passengers and express leaving Medford at 2:12 p. m., reach Spokane at 6:50 p. m., marking the first time it has been possible to leave Medford in the afternoon and have dinner in Spokane. United recently extended its coastwise route from Seattle to include spur to Spokane and Vancouver.
