## JAZZ EASES LAST HOURS OF SLAYER

STATE PRISON, FLORENCE, Ariz., Aug. 31.—(AP)—A jazz tune he pumped from his seclusion still ringing in his ears, Louis Sprague Douglas, 49, walked calmly into Arizona's lethal gas chamber shortly after midnight today and was executed for the murder of Ralph Hart, Yuma county prospector.

He was pronounced dead eight and one-half minutes after the gas was turned on at 12:39 a. m.

The former New York taxi driver, who protested his innocence to the last, passed his final hours playing the accordion that has brightened his weeks of waiting in condemned row. He began to play immediately after he had been baptized last night into the Catholic faith.

## GIRL DENIED LOVE KILLS BANKER SELF

MORRISTOWN, Tenn., Aug. 31.—(AP)—A bank president was fatally shot in his private office today by a girl who killed herself with the same weapon.

Witnesses said the girl, registered at a hotel as Miss Mary Sam Bruce of Nashville but carried a card giving her address as Lebanon, Tenn., walked into the office of J. C. Shelton, 35, president of the Hamblen national bank and a few minutes later the banker came out clutching his breast and slumped to the floor in the lobby.

The girl, a brunette about 27 years old, was found on the floor of the bank president's office. A pistol was nearby.

Police Chief B. P. Richardson, said a note found later in the girl's purse, read:

"I loved Jesse better than life. He was fine and honorable in every respect, but life to me is meaningless without him. Please notify my father, Rev. W. J. Bruce, Lebanon, by telegram. Will you do it tactfully?"

## DELAY SENTENCE OF ROSEBURG SHOOTER TO AWAIT OUTCOME

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 31.—(AP)—In view of the possibility of complications resulting from the wound received yesterday by E. M. Brooks, sentence of Henry Foss, who admitted shooting Brooks in order to stop work on a mill which he felt would damage his property, will be postponed until September 18, Circuit Judge B. L. Eddy stated today.

Foss appeared in court this morning and entered a plea of guilty to a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Brooks, he told the court, had been filling a watercote and the obstruction, Foss said he believed, would change the stream so that it would undermine his property.

He declared that he had failed to get relief from city police and health officers, to whom he had made complaints, and became suddenly aggravated and desperate and fired three shots at Brooks, intending to frighten him away from the work. The third shot struck Brooks in the arm.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Douglas Davis, Atlanta, Ga., flier, was first to finish in the trans-continental air race here today, but it was not immediately determined whether he would be the winner. The decision will rest upon the elapsed time taken by the three competitors in the race between Burbank, Calif., and Cleveland.

The elapsed time for Davis was nine hours, 26 minutes and 41 seconds. He arrived at 3:46 p. m. (E. S. T.).
