

FIRE LOSS \$4,758 IN CITY DURING PAST 3 MONTHS

A fire loss of only \$4,758.55 for the months of June, July and August was reported yesterday by Fire Chief Roy Elliott, who stated that 95 calls were made in this period.

Of this number nine have been residences, with the rest chiefly grass fires, a few awnings, and one or two automobiles. The most serious fire of the three-month period was the Hotel Medford blaze, which resulted in a loss of \$4,610.55. Fire at the Geddis and Dixon building on North Riverside, resulted in the only other serious loss during the past three months.

Thirty runs were made during June, 81 during July, and 34 in August, Elliott said.

Figures for the past eight months show that the total loss for that period amounted to \$7,429.25, from 139 calls, which is a very good record as compared to other fire departments of the state. The Medford department ranks second in Oregon, it was recently revealed by B. L. Berry, local insurance policy examiner, in a talk before a Kiwanis club meeting. This record regards all fire activities and loss average, and is compiled by the state fire marshal's office.

Chief Elliott urges that the public refrain from crowding close to fires, which results in danger to themselves and inconvenience to the fire department.

The regular meeting of volunteer firemen, scheduled for Monday night, has been postponed due to observance of Labor day, Elliott said.

CANFIELD AGAIN CRATER CHIEFTAIN

LINK NAVY BOAT FIRM TO MUNITION CZAR OF EUROPE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—(AP) Evidence of a direct connection between Sir Basil Zaharoff, powerful in European munitions circles, and a concern building boats for the American navy rested tonight in the hands of the senate munitions investigating committee.

This disclosure was made a short time before Senator Nye (R., N. D.), chairman of the committee, in a radio address accused munitions makers of spreading talk of war, from which they made "splendid profits." Hitting at sales of war materials abroad, he asserted in case of a war with Japan, Americans would be moved down with American-made munitions. He advocated a "department of peace," which would rank with the army and navy departments.

Members of the senate committee declined to discuss the letters that are reliably reported to show Zaharoff's connection with an American boat builder.

It was learned by the Associated Press early today unless there is a change in schedule, the senate committee will go directly into affairs of the Electric Boat company, of New York and Groton, Conn., during the first two days of open hearings.

This concern, records at the navy show, received contracts for construction of two submarines in the navy's building program last year and for three of the underwater craft this year.

Although committee members and investigators were silent, it was established the reported Zaharoff link is to be brought out during the questioning of the Electric Boat company's officials.

Zaharoff's interest in submarines dates back to the days when he first began the deals which aided in building his reputation as a super-salesman of war materials.

He persuaded the Greek government to buy a submarine and, using that as a lever, then sold two of the underwater craft to Greece's ancient enemy, Turkey. Sir Basil, himself, and other munitions salesmen have followed a similar procedure since.

MILLION TEXTILE WORKERS STRIKE, VIOLENCE LOOMS

bor relations board with the grim assertion:

"The strike will go on."

Involved were 150,000 silk workers, directed to join the others in an order flashed just before noon with 407,000 cotton textile workers and 100,000 woolen mills employees. Affected, too, were 200,000 now unemployed in these industries.

Rebuffed, but doggedly persistent, Lloyd Garrison, chairman of the labor relations board, had waged a twelve-hour battle to avert the catastrophe. Much of the board's own prestige; a possible blow to recovery; probable violence and certain suffering by textile workers all were at stake.

Violence appeared sure. Gorman had this to say:

"Our instructions are specific—to be peaceful if possible, but if our workers are slugged by hired thugs they are advised to slug back."

Throughout much of the pre-strike period execution of a walkout order depended upon the outcome of conferences between labor representatives and the national labor relations board.

During a recess in the hearing Garrison told reporters he saw a ray of hope for averting the walkout. Expectations rose when he said he "might have an important announcement."

There was no doubt but that the union definitely was prepared for violence. Gorman said every precaution was being taken to preserve order. But in a sheet of telegrams to governors of states affected by the strike he asked protection from "the forces of employers" and "the insidious and disruptive forces of communism."

The decision to call out some 150,000 silk workers was somewhat unexpected. Peter Van Horn, chairman of the silk code authority, sent word he would confer here Tuesday with Gorman and members of the strike committee. His message was interpreted as a possibility of laying groundwork for negotiations in that industry at least.

As for the other branches, George A. Sloan, head of the Cotton Textile Institute, and Arthur Besse, chairman of the wool code authority, both had refused flatly to send representatives to meet with the union.

Gorman explained, however, that the union was not satisfied with Van Horn's telegram.

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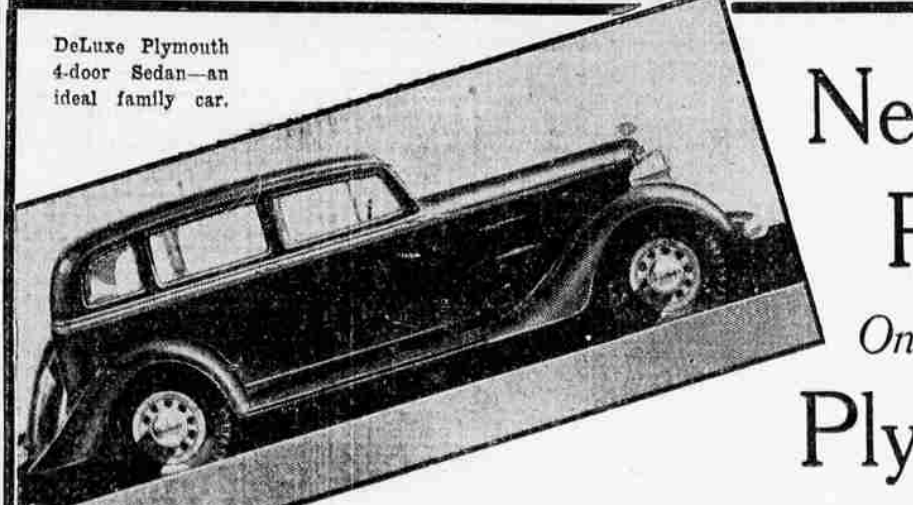
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
