Despite the whitewash, the Tigers' pennant prospects didn't suffer. While that mound duel was taking place, the Senators hit Yankee pitching with everything but last year's pennant to close their series with a 9 to 3 victory. That left Detroit still 5 1/2 games ahead.

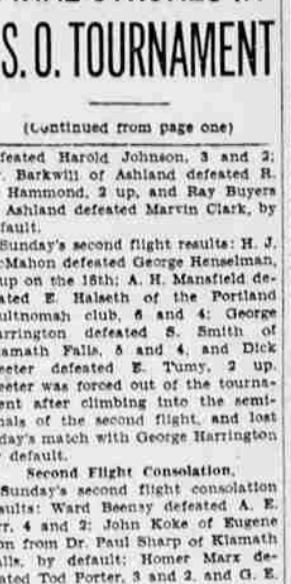

Twelve camps were represented, each with five swimmers and one diver. Major Clark H. Armstrong, district commander, was in attendance and was to award the trophy to the championship camp.

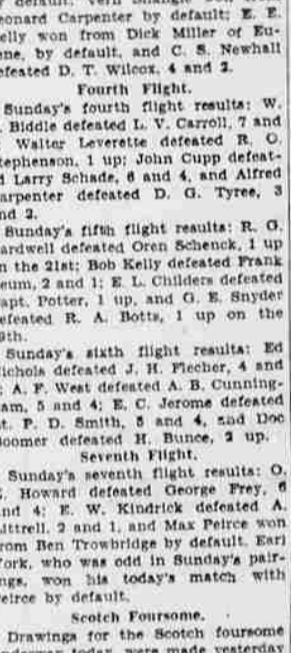

ROSENBLATT BOWS YOUNG STUDENT TO YOUNG GOLFER IS GOLF CHAMP

GEARHART - BY THE SEA, Ore., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Ed Palmrose, former Seaside, Ore., high school athlete, yesterday won undisputed mastery in the annual Oregon Coast mid-summer golf tournament by defeating Dr. Milford Rosenblatt, Tualatin, 1 up.

Palmrose was crowned Saturday as champion of the division for men under 32, while Dr. Rosenblatt won the senior men's championship.

He won here yesterday by defeating nineteen year old Don Edwards of San Jose, also a Stanford student, 11 up in the 36-hole final.

The finish was almost thrilling. Apparently beaten at the thirtieth, Edwards came back with a par equaling game that won him four out of the next five holes and squared the match at the thirty-fifth.

Japanese Troops Rescue Captives HARBIN, Manchukuo, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Safe after a terrifying experience as captives of desperate bandits, nine men, one an American, thanked Japanese troops today for their sensational rescue.

Robert M. Lury, an American, E. F. Johansen, a Dane, and seven Japanese were snatched from the bandits on a wooded sand bar in the Sungari river, by troops aboard the Japanese gunboat Komet.

The soldiers chased the outlaw, and in a spirited exchange of fire killed 25 of them. Fifteen more were wounded, and the Japanese commander believed his men accounted for all of them.

Portland Woman Believed Suicide PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 3.—(AP)—With a discharged 22 calibre rifle by her side, the body of Mrs. Merle King, Portland, was found in the basement of her home here Sunday. Her husband, who discovered the body, said Mrs. King recently suffered a nervous breakdown.

DEER TRAMPLES CCC FIRE FIGHTER CAMP RAND, CCC, Sept. 3. (Sp.)—Having your lantern broken, and being trampled by a buck deer, while on a fire-fighting expedition, is reversing the order of events, but that was the experience of William W. Shaffer, a local man in CCC Company 1650 of Camp Rand.

While leading a group of fire trail builders around the fire near Murphy, late Friday night, he startled a deer that had been asleep in a clump of brush, and the frightened animal, losing its sense of direction rushed straight for the men, knocking him down and leaving several bruised spots where sharp hoofs struck.

Shaffer reports that he is going back to that place after the season opens. He hopes that he may reverse the decision.
