

BUILDING IN CITY HITS NEW STRIDE

Building in the city of Medford this year is 75 per cent ahead of the total for the fiscal year ending September 1, 1933, Frank Rogers, building inspector announces. During the year ending Saturday, September 1, a total expenditure of \$73,722 has been filed as the building department. In the same period during 1933, the sum amounted to \$40,849. For the entire year of 1933, the total reached \$58,692.

Electrical permits and plumbing work done so far in 1934 is double that of the same 1933 period. Mr. Rogers stated. Fifty per cent of electrical work has been for range wiring, and considerable additional money has been spent for new equipment.

While the building figures listed are the actual expense, the total value of the work is near \$90,000, Mr. Rogers said.

SOCIALIST PARTY IS ANTI-SINCLAIR

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 3.—(AP)—The executive committee of the Socialist party was committed today to a fight against the election of Upton Sinclair, who won the Democratic nomination for governor of California.

In a formal statement, the committee declared that Sinclair is not a Socialist, has neither the open nor tacit support of the party and is not campaigning on a Socialist platform. Support of party candidates in California was urged.

HEAT CUTS 'GATE' AT OREGON FAIR

SALEM, Sept. 3.—(AP)—Excessive heat yesterday kept the attendance low at the state fair grounds, as well as causing the death of two animals brought here to place on exhibit.

Between two and three o'clock the temperature, as recorded on the official thermometer at the airport, reached a maximum of 101 degrees, the highest of the year.

Livestock, particularly in the swine division, was greatly distressed by the heat, one exhibitor reaching the grounds Sunday with one of his hogs dead and another dying.

Although the state fair did not officially open until today, the grounds were open to general admission yesterday, for those wishing to view the exhibits alone.

25,000 CANS FOOD PUT UP BY SERA
