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CRATER HIGHWAY SPEEDERS WARNED

Autoists were warned and urged by District Engineer Goodnight of the state highway commission to travel slower over the Agate-Little Butte section of the Crater Lake highway. Such action will minimize danger, save money for the highway commission and speed up the work of oiling, which is expected to start this week.

A number of arrests and threats of arrest for speeding have been made on this stretch of highway and more are scheduled as the admonitions have to date caused no wide observance.

This stretch is covered with loose gravel and several reports of broken windshields from flying stones have been received. There have also been a number of punctured tires from sharp rocks, the auto landing in the ditch, it is reported.

Engineer Goodnight says a number of new and larger warning signs will be erected in a day or two, and the motoring public is requested to comply with the speed and other regulations until the Agate-Little Butte section is again safe for fast going.

DAVIS HEARING TO BE SET THIS WEEK

Preliminary hearing of the charge of drunken driving against Al Davis of this city as the result of the auto crash at Bybee corner on the Jacksonville highway in which Edith Wright, 21, of Central Point sustained injuries necessitating amputation of her arm, will be held this week according to the district attorney's office.

Definite time for the hearing will be set at a consultation between the district attorney and Attorney Geo. M. Roberts, who has been retained as counsel for Davis.

Miss Wright is recovering from her injuries and operation and, according to the district attorney, will be able to testify. Kenneth Sutherland, 20, and George J. Haas, 19, occupants of the auto, sustained minor hurts. Davis received a gash on his leg and abdominal injuries.

The auto, according to the authorities, turned over three times when it struck the curve at high speed.
