BOND REFUNDING STATUTE TEST IS SOUGHT IN COURT

SALEM, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Construction of a 1933 statute authorizing municipalities to refund bonds without a vote of the people, is sought in mandamus proceedings filed in the state supreme court here today by J. H. Burton, a Douglas taxpayer, J. L. Gibbons, recorder of the city of Reedsport, in Reedsport county, was named defendant in the action.

Attorneys said that virtually every municipality in Oregon was interested in the outcome of this proceeding. On August 27, 1934, the Reedsport council passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of refunding bonds and sale of amount of \$140,500, which prescribed the form, maturity, interest rate and interest coupons. The ordinance directed the recorder to put the ordinance in three public places and publish a notice inviting proposals for the sale of the water bonds.

Gibbons was alleged to have refused to post the ordinance, seek proposals for their purchase, counterclaim the bonds or permit a facsimile of his signature to be engraved upon the coupons. Gibbons alleged that the ordinance was in conflict with section 1 of article 2 of the state constitution. He held, however, it was stated, that the issuance and sale of refunding bonds was entirely a local matter, purely municipal, with which the people of the state at large were not concerned.

MARTIN PROPOSES TO STAY ON JOB SALEM, Ore., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Congressman Charles H. Martin told friends who greeted him upon his arrival here last evening that if elected governor in November he will move his residence to Salem and devote his entire time to the duties of the office.

"The business of directing the affairs of the state of Oregon is a big enough job to demand the entire time of any man who holds the office of governor," he said.

"The responsibilities of the office should not be delegated to anyone. If elected I propose to make my home right here and devote my full time and personal attention to the state's business."
