

DARK HORSE WILL DEFEAT SINCLAIR SAYS CALIFORNIAN

Peter P. Myhand, Here On Visit, Declares Author Will Be Beaten by Raymond L. Haight in Finals

Peter P. Myhand of Merced, Calif., member of the California state board of agriculture and prominent democrat, upon his arrival in Medford yesterday to renew old acquaintances with P. G. Denson, manager of the Hotel Medford, stated that the "visionary" candidate for the California governorship, can never be perpetuated, and prophesied that a dark horse, Raymond L. Haight, running on the commonwealth ticket, will be the next governor of California.

Mr. Myhand, who will remain in Medford until Monday, is staying at the Hotel Medford, where he and "Pete" are talking over old times. The two were boyhood friends in the east.

Mr. Myhand seemed completely absorbed in the outcome of the California state elections, and said that he had no time for other political interests. "This is the biggest occasion in politics that California has ever known," he said. "We want to choose a man who will not only please the citizens of California, but one who will win the honor and respect of our sister states."

"No, Upton Sinclair will not be the next governor," said Mr. Myhand. "Sinclair's plans are all election. His big vote in the general election was socialistic, and most of that came from Los Angeles alone. Now he has announced that he is a full-fledged democrat, casting aside all socialistic relations and losing the support of his former party."

When asked his opinion of the famous author's statement that is elected his first official act will be to pardon Tom Mooney, Mr. Myhand said, "It doesn't look very well for a candidate for governor to say that he will open the bars for a dynamiter who took human lives in the Preparedness day bombing in San Francisco."

Sinclair's trip east to see President Roosevelt will not avail him anything, according to Mr. Myhand, who also doesn't believe the democratic convention Sept. 30 at Sacramento will endorse the author for the governorship. "If Sinclair should win the election," Mr. Myhand continued, "it would mean the disruption of the democratic party."

Haight Is Man "Then who, in your opinion, should be elected?" was asked. "There is a dark horse in the race," Mr. Myhand replied, "who will be the next governor of California—Raymond L. Haight, who is running on the commonwealth ticket." He is a substantial business man of 38 years of age, who has served as a member of the California Railway commission, Mr. Myhand added.

Alarmed over the political situation, California realizes that the visionary dreams of Upton Sinclair can never be perpetuated, and that Acting Governor Frank P. Merriam's reactionary activities will not be endorsed by the democrats. Therefore the progressive democrats and republicans will support Haight.

But Mr. Myhand still does not think that Raymond L. Haight is the best choice. "If C. C. Young, who was defeated in the primaries on the republican ticket, had been chosen as a candidate and elected, there is no doubt that he would have been one of the best governors California has ever had."

Eye Candidate's Past People are forgetting about political parties and delving more into a candidate's past. Mr. Myhand said, and commented that while Sinclair is a "wonderfully fluent writer, he is not a business man."

Seemingly much impressed by the beauty and size of the valley's pear orchards, Mr. Myhand will visit many of them and other points of interest in the valley while here, accompanied by Mr. Denson. "I know all about my host's hospitality," Mr. Myhand concluded, "as he built the Tioga hotel in Merced." He explained that the Tioga hotel was built to accommodate Yosemite National park tourists, and has proved one of the most popular hotels in the state.

DOG TAKES KITTEN TO DAILY MEALS

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 7.—(AP)—General James K. Parsons, commander of Vancouver barracks, has witnessed some interest-compelling incidents in a long and varied career. Among the most fascinating was the one he related today.

On a tour of inspection he visited the Mary's Creek CCC camp near Salem. From the mess-hall he saw a mongrel female dog departing with a kitten in its mouth. Inquiry among the tree troopers developed that the dog, whose ownership is undetermined, three times a day at mealtime, searches the kitten out in the woods, picks it up and brings it to the mess-hall for food. As the meal is over the dog again collars the kitten and returns it to the woods.

The tree troopers declared that in the two weeks this has been going on neither the dog nor the kitten has missed a meal.

RELIEF OFFICE SCENE OF RIOT

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 7.—(AP)—One man was injured fatally during hand to hand fights Thursday between police and sheriff's deputies and agitators attempting to picket federal emergency relief administration headquarters.

An undetermined number were injured. The dead man was not immediately identified. He was believed to be a member of the would-be picketing force of about 200 which twice was

subdued by tear gas and clubs. He was run down by a truck as officers and rioters charged through the street in front of the relief headquarters.
