the initiative and referendum, he predicted that a special election on the plan would be called in less than a month after he took office.

During the interview somebody said his plan sounded like a "bloodless revolution."

"Of course it is," he exclaimed. "That's what we're talking about."

He wasn't much concerned by the criticism which has been hurled at his plan by Norman Thomas, former Socialist candidate for president.

"Well," he said, "I have left Mr. Thomas' church. His objection is that I am not doing things in the name of Karl Marx."

"I am using American language and American psychology. In California, everybody is middle class. Those in the working class won't admit it. They dress and act and think middle class. So you can't get anywhere in California by talking about the working class."

PENDLETON, Sept. 7.—(P)—By a vote of 782 to 40 Pendleton residents yesterday voted to include the eastern Oregon state hospital for the insane within the city limits in order that about \$95,000 in federal money may be used in construction of a new approach for the Old Oregon trail in west Pendleton.

Fred Starboard, taxidermist, charged with larceny by bailee, in a complaint filed by Roy Davis, had a hearing before Justice of the Peace William R. Coleman yesterday, and was given until September 29 to adjust the matter.

Davis alleged that last November he brought to Starboard's place of business in this city a bear hide of the value of \$15, to be stuffed and mounted. He testified he gave Starboard \$4 for the work, but as yet has not received the stuffed bear hide. He desires its return, or the equivalent thereof.

Starboard told the court that he had sent the bear hide with another shipment of furs of valley trappers to San Francisco for mounting and other taxidermy work, and as yet has not received them back. The court then allowed him three weeks in which to straighten out the matter.

The district attorney informed the court that similar complaints against Starboard had been received from the Rogue River district.

William Rush Pittenger, well-known resident of southern Oregon, passed away quietly at the family residence, 707 West Jackson street, at 4:45 p. m. Thursday, after a lengthy illness. Mr. Pittenger was born at Paris, Ill., October 23, 1859.

When a child of 9 years he moved with his parents to Kansas, where he attended school, grew to young manhood and later met Miss Sallie Lee Shavers. They were united in marriage at Nevada, Mo., March 1, 1882. Mr. and Mrs. Pittenger celebrated their 52nd wedding anniversary last March. They came to southern Oregon five years ago, living here continuously since that time.

He was a man of fine Christian character, a good neighbor and friend, and leaves many friends who will mourn his loss. He leaves his widow, Mrs. Sallie Lee Pittenger of Medford; three daughters (Zelma Pittenger having passed away in infancy)—Mrs. E. A. Robertson, Portland, Ore.; Mrs. Marie P. Hingle, Muncie, Ind.; one son, C. C. Pittenger of Medford; also three grandchildren—Dorothy, Maxine and Robert Pittenger.

DAM WILL FLOOD COLUMBIA ROAD

THE DALLES, Ore., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Approximately \$10,000,000 must be spent to rebuild the Columbia River highway between The Dalles and Troutdale as a result of realignment necessitated by the construction of the huge Bonneville dam across the river.

E. B. Aldrich, Pendleton publisher and member of the Oregon highway commission, gave this estimate in an address before the Kiwanis club here Thursday.

The Dalles-Cascade Locks section probably will cost \$3,500,000, Aldrich said; the Cascade Locks-Multnomah Falls stretch will take \$2,000,000 to complete, and an expenditure of about \$2,500,000 will be necessary on the Multnomah Falls-Troutdale section.

ELECTRIC CHAIR FOR LANDLADY

COOPERSTOWN, N. Y., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Kissing each other goodbye, Mrs. Eva Coo and Mrs. Martha Clift separated today, the former to be driven to Sing Sing prison to await execution and the later to imprisonment at Bedford Hills prison for women.

Mrs. Coo, widowed inn-keeper, was convicted of the insurance murder of Harry Wright, her handyman. Mrs. Clift pleaded guilty to participation in the crime.

The two prisons are only a few miles apart. Mrs. Coo, 47, and Mrs. Clift, 28, were both in tears as they were driven away in separate machines.

Mrs. Coo also bade goodbye to Harry Nablager, her lover, who testified against her.

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Scared To Death In County Bastile

KANSAS CITY, (UP)—Martin Flynn, 50, was ordered held on a statutory charge. Deputies at the county jail began taking his finger-

prints. Flynn, trembling violently, said: "I'm going to die. Pray for me." He did. An ambulance physician attributed death to fright.
