## FIRE LINE HOLDS MURPHY BLAZE IN STRICT CONFINES

National Forest, are in charge of the crew, most of which is comprised of men from Steamboat camp, under the supervision of Gordon Marsh, in charge of O. and C. land.

Supervisor Janouch stated today that there is no doubt that the Applegate forest fire was started from a cigarette or match tossed from the Jacksonville-Ruch highway. Examination of the area has revealed that the fire started at a point 4 1/2 miles from Jacksonville and 3 1/2 miles from Ruch, one mile south of the Bering road junction, where dry grass had been burned in a narrow strip running for some distance along the road, before spreading in both directions into the timber.

The suppression of the Jacksonville fire, Janouch said, is one of the outstanding accomplishments of the forest service during the past several years. Seldom has a fire advanced so rapidly, and very exceptionally has a crew succeeded in extinguishing a 5000-acre blaze in such a short time, he said.

Sixty five men have been left on duty at the fire line, but the Applegate camp has abandoned its temporary quarters on the road.

## COMMUNISTS KILL CRUSADING EDITOR

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 7.—(AP)—Howard Gulliford, former publisher of sensational Minneapolis weekly newspapers, was slain last night by assassins "hired by communists," Jay M. Near, his former partner, asserted today.

Near disclosed that he had received a letter threatening him with bodily harm, scrawled with indelible pencil and signed and postmarked "Pittsburgh." Near said he received two previous notes from the same author which attacked him for "anti-communist writings," but did not threaten him.

Gulliford and Near achieved national prominence several years ago when their publication, "Saturday Press" was suppressed under the Minnesota "gas law" which later was held unconstitutional by the United States supreme court.

Washing high upon the sands at Malibu Beach, the ground swells damaged beach fences at the homes of John Gilbert, Corinne Griffith, Mike Levee and Lou Siller. Crews of workmen were rushed to the colony and two thousand sacks of sand were piled as a barricade against the waves.

Among the screen figures who live at Malibu are Richard Arlen, Bebe Daniels, Lupe Velez, Johnny Weismuller, and the Marx brothers. No actual damage had occurred to any residences.

Battering the pleasure piers at Long Beach again yesterday, the ocean tore a 40 foot hole in the rock fill of the new Rainbow pier and loosened more than 150 feet of the understructure. The 500 foot Pine avenue pier, which collapsed Wednesday, was virtually wiped out yesterday.

From the splintered sacks of floating debris the body of an unidentified man was taken. His skull was fractured.

More than 100 men with tractors, dredging shovels and trucks were organized at Long Beach to clear away the beach wreckage, a menace to other piers.

Water swished across the streets at Balboa and Newport and covered some sections of interurban track. Forty men were attempting to block the rush of water across the railroad. Piling of sea-de homes at West Newport creaked under the blows of the ocean.

The waves seemed to me diminishing last night.
