

BUDGET DRAFTERS TO BE NAMED SOON BY COUNTY COURT

The county court, with the three members appointed, acts as the budget committee.

According to the assessor, the county valuation will be about the same as last year.

Many of the county offices are preparing their budgets for the coming year. They, too, will be about the same as last year. All the offices, by the practice of the strictest economy, have managed to keep within the budget and end the year within the yearly allowance.

Relief funds and repair of county roads, many of which are beginning to show the effects of four years of war and tear with only casual attention owing to shortage of funds, are expected to be two of the knottiest problems confronting the budget committee.

First meeting of the budget committee is expected to be called for the last of this month.

"There is a shortage in the United States as a whole," he said, "and Medford Newtowns alone with other northwest apples, will bring top prices, especially for the larger size."
