

CURATIVE POWERS OF VITAMIN C ARE TOLD SCIENTISTS

Complexion Bleach, Remedy for Haemophilia, Hemorrhages and Pyorrhoea Is Most Recent Discovery

ABERDEEN, Scotland, Sept. 7.—(AP)—Lord Raglan, chairman of the anthropological society, who yesterday stated his belief that before many centuries have elapsed there will "not be a single person in America without a certain portion of negro blood," today told the British association for the advancement of science that popular beliefs are always wrong.

He told the convention that it was "quite untrue" that humans were attracted by opposites and said, "we are really attracted by and marry people like ourselves."

It was recalled that Lord Raglan created a stir in last year's convention by debunking the claims of some of England's best families to Norman blood.

Vitamin for Complexion
Pure vitamin C, the scientist was told, will bleach human complexions darkened by disease. This and other diseases which it was said to cure are certain forms of haemophilia, various types of hemorrhages and pyorrhoea.

These unexpected medical uses for the vitamin in its powerful pure form were described by Professor A. Szent-Gyorgyi, one of the leaders in isolating the substance.

Vitamin-C's magic role first appears in history when Capt. Cook discovered that eating citrus fruits would both prevent and cure the scurvy that made morgues of sailing vessels on prolonged voyages. The vitamin itself was recognized only about a decade ago.

Limited Access
Until the last two or three years human access to its benefits had been limited mainly to eating oranges, lemons, tomatoes, spinach, cabbage, lettuce and some other foods which contain it in small, greatly diluted amounts.

In 1932 Prof. Szent-Gyorgyi discovered that ascorbic acid had powerful anti-scurvy properties. The discovery led soon to a general agreement among scientists that ascorbic acid was vitamin C, the anti-scurvy vitamin.

The acid has become available for medicine only very recently. Prof. Szent-Gyorgyi said, so that its medical applications are not yet sufficiently determined but the first clinical medical experiments "have revealed some very striking and unexpected effects."

Striking Cures
"Ascorbic acid," he said, "seems to be able to cure in a very striking manner several diseases against which medicine was helpless."
Haemophilia, one of these diseases, is excessive bleeding from even slightest cuts. Well known as an affliction of many male members of Spain's royal house, it made impossible an operation to save the life of Don Gonzalo, youngest son of ex-King Alfonso, after an automobile crash in Austria.

Professor Szent-Gyorgyi said the major part of pathologic pigmentations can be made to disappear by the acid. Patients with Addison's disease, which is characterized by brownish pigmentation, can be bleached out again, he said.

Lack Is Proved
"These curative effects," the professor commented, "suggest that humanity is suffering much more gravely from lack of vitamin C than has hitherto been supposed."

He said that the exact biological role played by the substance is unknown.
