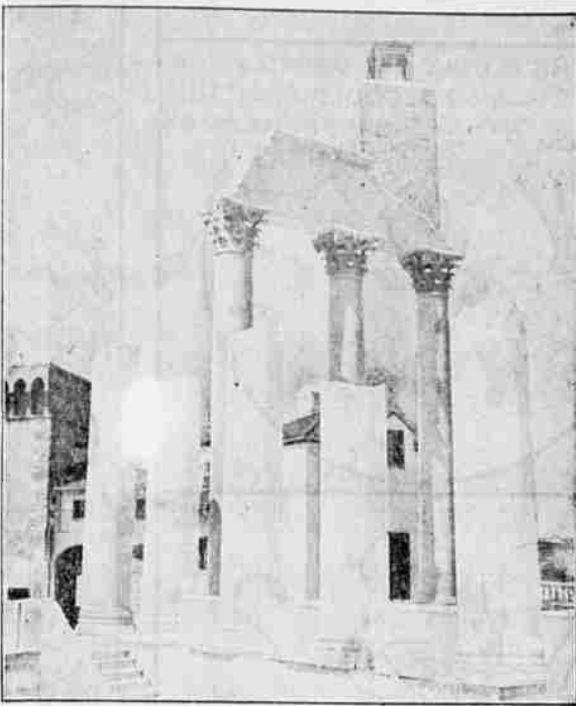
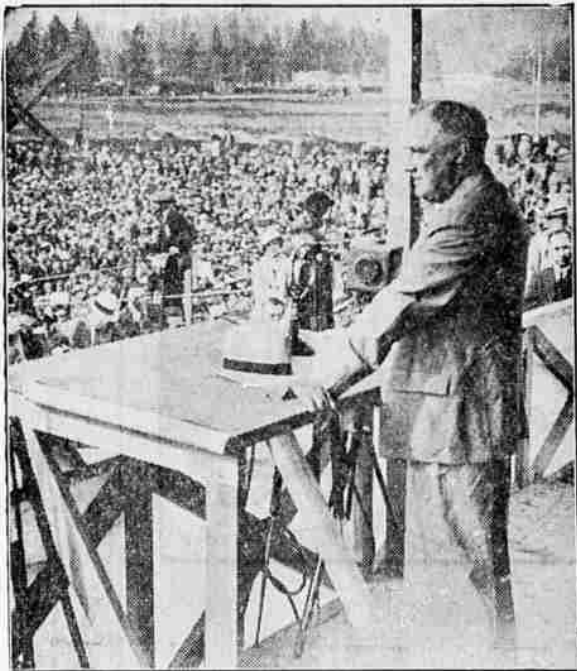


Rebuild Roman Ruins at Fair



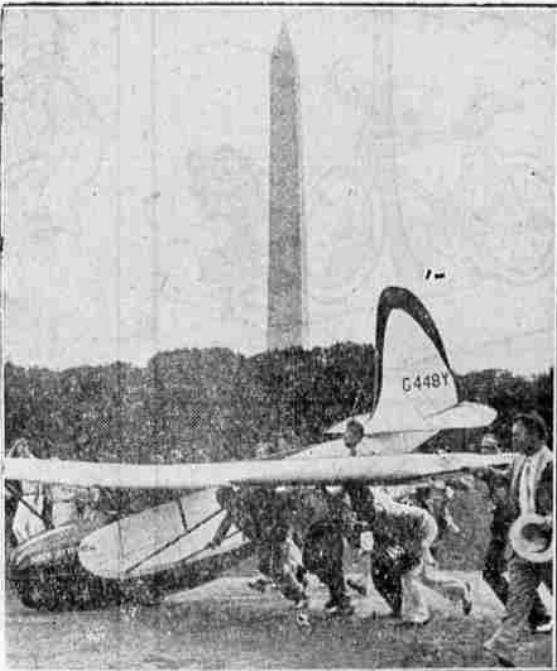

MAIL GLIDER LANDS AT CAPITAL

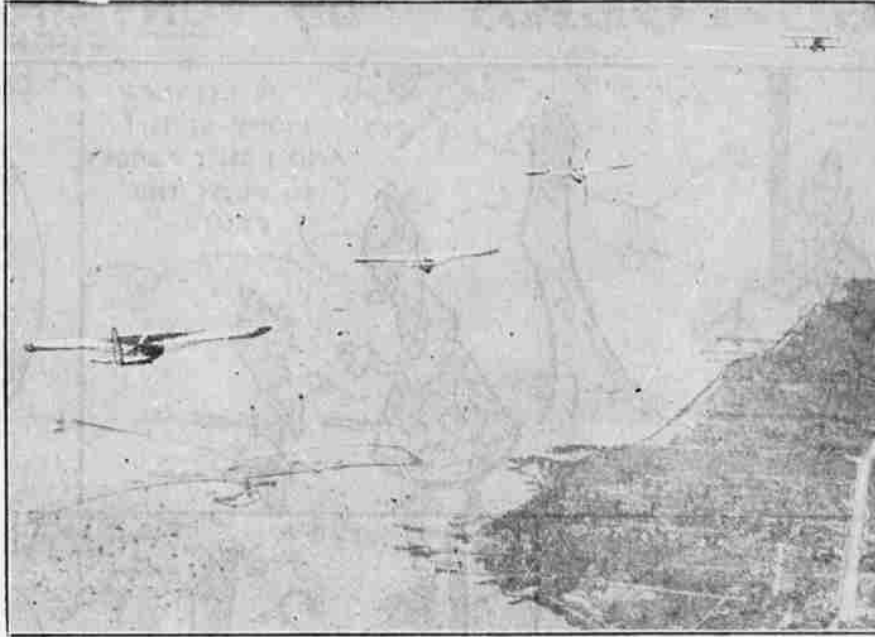

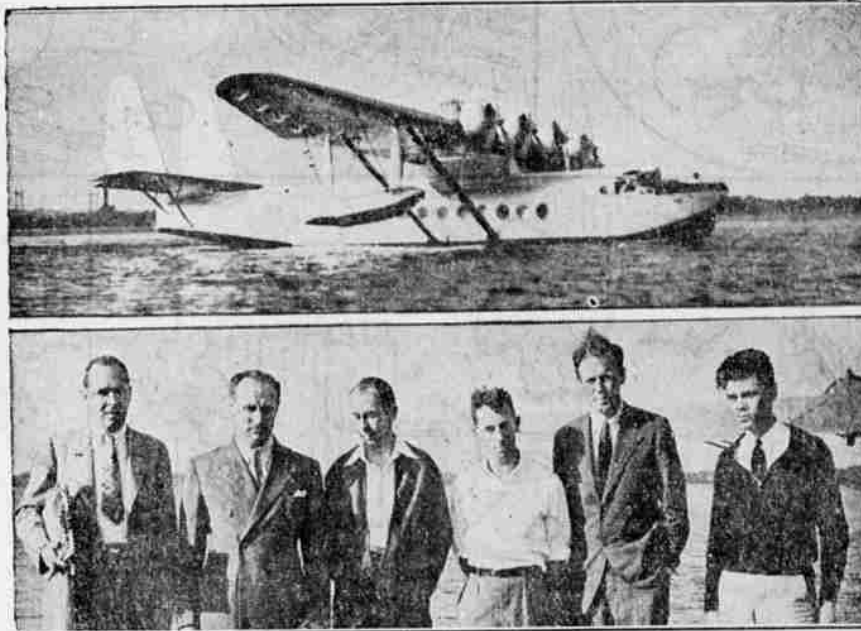

Marathon Golfer

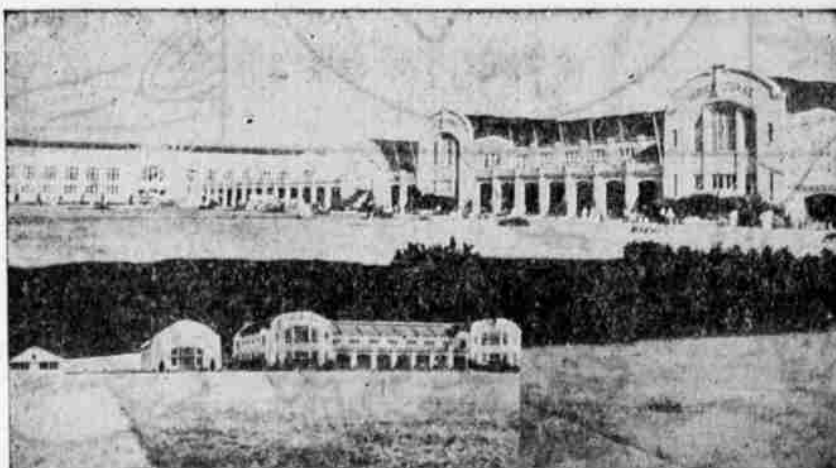

CHAPLIN'S SONS LEAVE HOSPITAL

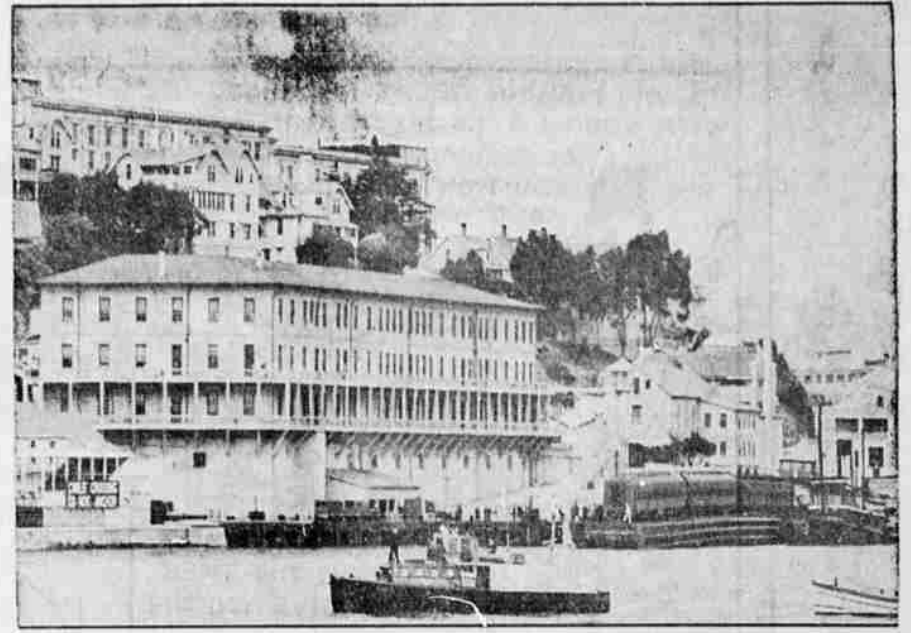
