

ROAD COMMISSION TO LET CONTRACTS FOR BIG PROJECTS

Three Jobs On Portland-to-Sea Highways On List—Million and Half Dollars Worth of Work in Sight

SALEM, Sept. 14.—(P)—Three projects on the two Portland-to-the-sea highways will be let at the first meeting of the state highway commission in Portland following approval of the Public Works Administration of the allocation of the federal \$3,100,000 funds allotted to Oregon, it was announced today. Bids will be called at once for the session which has been changed to Monday, October 1.

The 3.82 miles of grading on the Wilson River highway, specifically designated by the government, will be the first on the list. This is in Tillamook county on the Deadman creek-Brooks section. Two jobs on the Wolf Creek project, totaling about 14 miles, will also be let.

About a million dollars' worth of projects will be awarded at the session, to be followed by more than half million dollars more at the second session set for October 11. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced.

Other road projects will be let in Clackamas, Grant, Klamath, Lane and Multnomah counties. Bridges to be constructed will include the large Milwaukee undercrossing on the Oregon City-Portland highway. Other spans to be awarded are those over Burnt river on the Baker-Unity highway in Baker county and over Oak creek and Lake creek in Linn county. Storage buildings at Enterprise and Roseburg will also be contracted for. The highway projects for which bids will be opened are as follows: Tillamook county—Deadman creek-Brooks section of the Wilson River highway, 3.82 miles grading. Clatsop county—Neacum-Elaie section of Wolf Creek highway, 11.28 miles grading and surfacing. Clatsop county—Ranger station-Elaie section of Wolf Creek highway, 2.53 miles grading. Clackamas county—Buck Creek and Eagle Creek secondary highways, 3.6 miles surfacing. Grant county—Forest boundary-Long creek section of Pendleton-John Day highway, 17.28 miles surfacing. Klamath county—Gold Lake trail-Ocell lake section of Willamette highway, 2.84 miles grading. Lane county—Portland-Washington county line section of West Side Pacific highway, 3.3 miles paving.

SOCIAL IMPOSTER PROVES PROBLEM FOR PORTLANDERS

PORTLAND, Sept. 14.—(P)—What disposition to make of Maynard Proemke was a question that had city officials troubled today. They couldn't decide whether they wanted him badly enough to go to a considerable expense to keep him.

Proemke, in immaculate garb, claiming impeccable connections, and armed with sheaves of gilt-edged but reputedly spurious references, the most important of which designated him as a prominent official of a Toronto banking house, cut a wide swath through Portland's upper society circle last month.

He was dined and wined in the best homes, and climaxed his meteoric venture by marrying Miss Elizabeth Halley, former president of the Portland Junior league.

Then the denouement. He was booked on a bad check charge; shattered references fell around him like ripe wheat in a hail storm; the Portland bank declared he didn't work for them and never did, and Cleveland and Sacramento police said they wanted him badly. His arrest followed his marriage by 48 hours, and now his wife is suing for an annulment.

HOMES FOR POOR LINN COUNTY PLAN

ALBANY, Ore., Sept. 14.—(P)—A plan to build homes for indigent families on property owned by Linn county on money provided by the state emergency relief administration, was put before the state relief committee yesterday by the Linn county relief group.

The suggestion was that an initial group of five four-room houses be built and rented to occupants who would pay the rent from income received from SERRA projects. Land is available near Albany. The sites would be large enough so that each householder could have a yard and a sizeable garden.

PETITION TO KILL RESTAURANT CODE MEETS REJECTION

SALEM, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Petitions recently filed with Governor Meier by the Oregon Retail Alcoholic Beverage Dispensers, asking that operation of the Oregon restaurant code be rescinded, were rejected today by Max Gehlhar, state director of agriculture.

Gehlhar's order was based on the contention that 75 per cent of the restaurant operators in Oregon had not signed the petitions which is the number required to annul the code. He said that 2,625 signatures were required to annul the code while after deducting duplications and withdrawals the petitions presented by the dispensers organization contained only 1,232 signatures.

The charge was made by Gehlhar that a large number of the petitioners had signed under misrepresentation as to the contents and purposes of the marketing agreement. "It is apparent that the petitions were circulated by paid circulators of the organization," Gehlhar said, "and that the signers thereof do not represent the attitude of any substantial part of the real restaurant industry of Oregon."

Gehlhar attached to his statement a number of signatures, including the "Beer Bucket," "Big Stein," "Barrel House" and others. He said in order that the real restaurant industry of Oregon may be released from the attempted control by retail liquor dealers the marketing agreement has been amended to eliminate therefrom all of these handling beer or other alcoholic beverages exclusively.

HARD WINTER AHEAD FORECAST OF GEESE

GREAT FALLS, Mont. (UP)—A tough winter for Montana is presaged

by those ancient weather prophets, the wild geese. They already have begun their southern flight. Ranchers near Flower Lake, 22 miles northeast of here, report that sizeable flocks have visited the water within the last few days. They are said to be unmistakably migrants. Indians and woodsmen believe that instinct warns the geese to flee a stern winter by early flight.

90 FAST TRUCKS FOR GUARDSMEN

SALEM, Sept. 14.—(AP)—Ninety new fast trucks for speedy transportation of troops were received by the Oregon national guard today, it was announced at the headquarters here by Lieutenant Colonel Joseph V. Schur, quartermaster.

The vehicles, purchased by the government, were recently allotted to Oregon for rapid mobilization of troops. They are of special design and have a high cruising speed. They represent a federal investment of \$75,000.

The trucks will be kept at the Withycombe rifle range at Clackamas, where the guard has the same number of large slow trucks for hauling equipment.
