LOCAL GIRLS AT VOCATIONAL CAMP

Through a special grant of FEPA funds, a resident educational school for 60 unemployed girls has been established for a month at Willamette university in Salem, under the general supervision of the state department of education.

Grace Garrison and Sabrina Thatcher were chosen representatives from Jackson county in attendance at the school, which ends Saturday.

Miss Garrison and Miss Thatcher have been housed at Lusanna Hall dormitory with the regular house mother for Willamette university girls. They were selected by the Jackson county relief committee from among unemployed girls 18 to 35 years of age who were eligible for relief.

The primary purpose of the camp was to provide opportunities for the women in vocational training, home-making classes, and other educational and recreational activities, such as recreational reading, public affairs, home management, family budgeting, home recreation, home furnishing, social and economic problems, preparation for parenthood, literature appreciation, personal problems, personal hygiene, meal planning, table serv-

HOW TO MAKE THE BEST RIPE PLUM JAM

4 cups (2 lbs.) crushed fruit
1/2 cup water
7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1/2 bottle Certo
