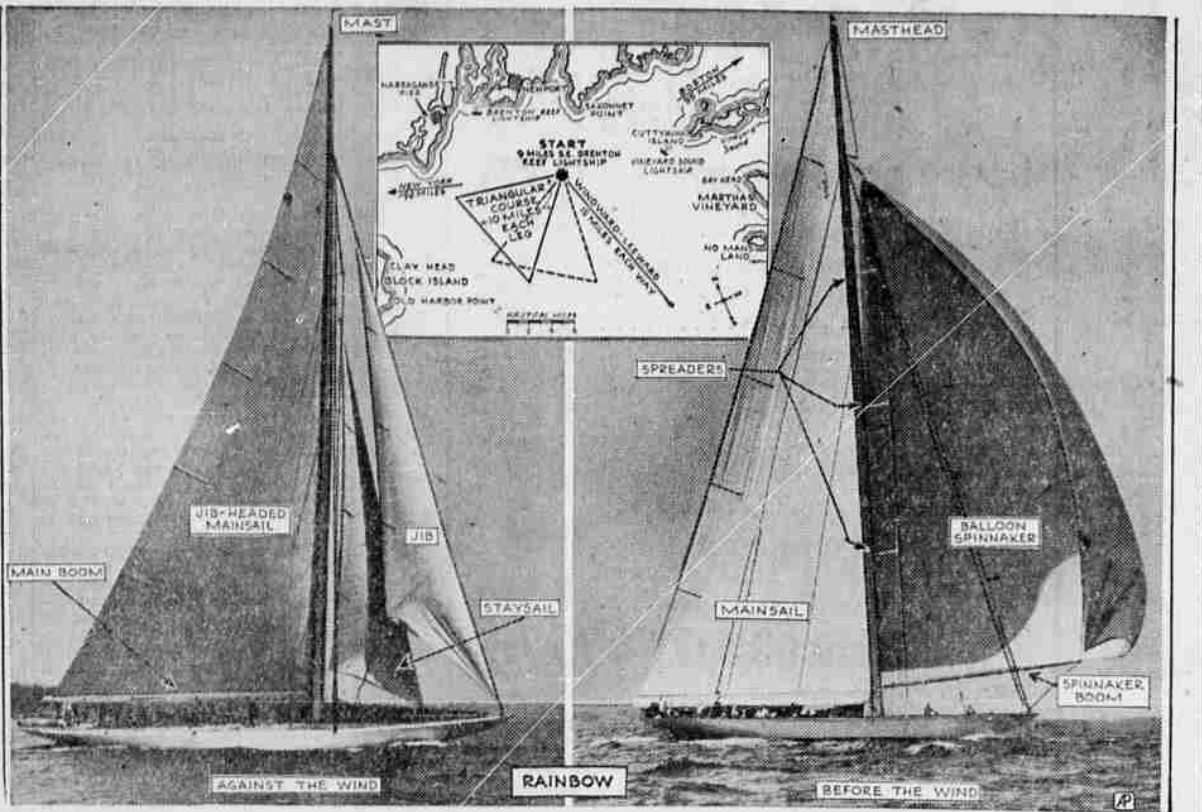


BURGER FACING TOUGH PROBLEM STUFFING HOLES

Football will be in full swing one day after school opens. Football suits will be issued the first day. Burger will find quite a problem in filling the vacancies left by graduation of Max Gillinsky, Tommy White, Ed Bennett, Lloyd Hammack and Bill Prentice. All five of these boys, while playing in the uniforms of the red and black, won recognition as all-southern Oregon men.

HUNTING RULES FOR 1934 LISTED BY COMMISSION

Deer Season September 20 to October 25—Pheasant Season October 15 to October 31, Inclusive.

Following is synopsis of 1934 hunting regulations as promulgated by the Oregon State Game Commission pursuant to authority contained in section 2, chapter 174, Oregon Laws, 1933: All opening and closing orders have been determined on the basis of providing each county with the greatest variety of hunting consistent with conservation of game to the ultimate benefit of the state at large. DEER—Open season entire year except in Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties where open season is from November 1 to November 30. BUCK DEER WITH FORKED HORNS—Open season September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Bag limit, two Columbian blacktail deer, or one mule deer, with the requirement that both deer tags must be affixed to the mule deer. BULL ELK HAVING HORNS—Open season November 5 to November 11, both dates inclusive. Open territory, all of Baker county except that portion lying southwest of the John Day highway; Wallowa county north of the base line and west of the Imnaha river; all of Union and Umatilla counties except approximately 20,000 acres in Conklin Springs area and known as the Mt. Emily game refuge; that portion of Grant county lying north of the middle fork of the John Day river and east of the Pendleton-John Day highway. Bag limit, one bull elk with horns. (Foregoing regulations on open season for elk were determined as the results of surveys and recommendations of the United States forest service and are for the purpose of reducing the herds in the areas declared open to hunting 10 per cent of the estimated elk population to prevent continued over-grazing on concentrated areas.) SILVER GRAY SQUIRRELS—Open season September 15 to October 20 in Baker, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Crook, Curry, Gilliam, Grant, Jackson, Jefferson, Josephine, Klamath, Lincoln, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Tillamook, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa and Wheeler counties; provided there is an open season the entire year in Clackamas, Marion, Yamhill, Washington, Benton, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Jackson counties. Open season Sept. 20 to Oct. 25, both dates inclusive, in Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Wheeler, Jefferson, Deschutes, Crook, Klamath, Harney and Malheur counties. Open season, August 20 to September 20, both dates inclusive, in Baker, Union and Wallowa counties. Open season (sooty or blue grouse only) September 20 to October 25, both dates inclusive, in Grant county. Bag limit, four such birds in any one day or eight in any seven consecutive days. That portion of Tillamook county, Washington and Yamhill counties known as the Tillamook burn area was ordered closed for 1934. The open season for the trapping of muskrats in Oregon was declared, by order of the game commission, to be from December 1 to February 28 of the year following, both dates inclusive, except in Klamath county, where the open season shall be from January 1 to April 15, both dates inclusive. Canyon creek, located in Linn county, was declared to be closed to angling to and including April 14, 1935.

STINER HOPEFUL DESPITE HARDEST BEAVER SCHEDULE

Loss of 12 Lettermen Leaves Mentor Undismayed—Offensive Tactics Will Be Stressed This Season

SMITH Associated Press Staff Writer CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 14.—(AP)—A good football player, to enjoy the game, must like the roughness and the toughness of it, and must not whimper when the going is hardest for himself and his team. Such is the philosophy of Coach Len Stiner of Oregon State college, who produced the famous "iron man" team of 1933. And that is the reason why, although the Beavers have the most arduous eleven-game schedule ever faced by any O. S. C. team and have lost 12 lettermen from last year's squad, a note of optimism pervades the college campus. Lot of Fun, Anyway The results may be good, bad or indifferent, but there's going to be a lot of fun in it for everybody. That's the way young Stiner figures. Six of the 12 lettermen lost by graduation were regulars on last year's first string, among them the redoubtable Tar Schwammel, all-American tackle; Hal Joslin, fullback; and Vic Curtin, one of the best ends in the business. But another all-American, Norman (Red) Franklin, who sent the customers into hysterics with a sensational, historic touchdown run against Fordham university, will be in uniform tomorrow when the Beaver clan gathers for the season. This 165-pound ball-carrying halfback is the nucleus around which Coach Stiner will form his 1934 team. Offensive Is Thing Last season Coach Stiner concentrated on the solid (iron man) defense because he had to; this year he will bear down heavy on offensive tactics. Clyde Devine, 6 feet 6 inches tall and 191 pounds, will see plenty of action at center. He is already famous for the play, the "DeVine dive," in which he is sprung atop the shoulders of the tackles, to knock down kicks headed for the goal posts. Ed McIntosh, alternate last year, seems slated for blocking halfback; and Arnold Hetkenen, reserve, will get a chance at full. Bob Patrick and Willard Jarvis are being groomed as subs for the flank, Franklin, it is thought, is quarterback. YACHTS TO SAIL FIRST CUP RACE EARLY SATURDAY

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 14.—(AP)—Nine miles southwest of Brenton's reef, out on the open ocean, two of the most graceful and speediest sailing craft ever built will open a contest tomorrow morning for possession of an unattractive silver trophy that has since 1851 indicated the supremacy of American yachtsmen over British. If a sailing breeze is ruffling the water, the starting gun will boom at 7:40 a. m., Pacific standard time. Absence of a breeze would bring 15-minute postponements, and possibly postponement for the day. Races will be sailed daily, except Sundays, until one boat has won four. The trophy is the America's cup, won by the schooner America when she whipped a fleet of British yachts in a race around the Isle of Wight 83 years ago. Fourteen British and Canadian challengers have in the intervening years returned empty-handed.
