

OLGA E. ANDERSON, COUNTY EMPLOYEE, PASSES SUDDENLY

Olga E. Anderson, chief office clerk in the sheriff's office, and one of the best known women in Jackson county, passed away suddenly at her home in Garfield court, where she had recently moved, Friday night at 9:10 o'clock. Her death was a shock to the community, and followed an illness of only a few moments. Cause of death was chronic pulmonary edema, with a contributory cause of chronic nephritis.

Miss Anderson had been long connected with the county court house. She started her position in the sheriff's office 12 years ago under Charles Tertilt, later continuing under Ralph Jennings and serving under Sheriff Walter J. Olmstead up until her untimely death. She was always a genial and efficient public servant.

Funeral services have been arranged for Monday at 2:30 o'clock, at the funeral home, with Reverend Peterson of Phoenix officiating. State police will escort the funeral procession to Siskiyou Memorial park, where interment will take place. Active pallbearers will be County Judge Earl B. Day, Justice of Peace William H. Coleman, County Physician C. I. Drummond, former sheriff Charles Tertilt, and Ralph Jennings, and Sheriff Walter J. Olmstead. Honorary pallbearers will be Edith Martin, Gertrude Butler, Elva Mitchell, Josephine Koppes, Gertrude Martin and Blanche Runels, all fellow county workers. The courthouse will be closed in respect to her memory Monday for one hour, from two until three o'clock.

Miss Anderson was born at Denver, Colo., January 29, 1896, and was aged 38 years, seven months and 18 days at her death. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gustav Anderson, made their home in Telluride, Colo., where they lived for many years, and where her father passed away in 1910. In 1912 Mrs. Anderson was united in marriage to Maurice Kallstrom, and with her daughters, Olga and Lillie, came to southern Oregon in the following year, making their home in the Coleman creek district.

Olga attended Medford high school during the years of 1912 and 1913, when she was forced to leave because of ill health. After recovering, she went to Portland to attend Bohne-Walker business college. Upon her graduation from this school, Miss Anderson accepted a position with Oida-Worthington and King, and later with the First National Bank of Portland.

Miss Anderson soon went to San Francisco, and was there employed at Livingston's, where she remained for some time. From San Francisco she went to Los Angeles to accept a position as instructor for Bohne-Walker Business College in the use of office equipment. From Los Angeles, Miss Anderson returned to Medford, immediately taking the position in the sheriff's office. She made her home with her step-father, her mother having passed away February 7, 1933.

Besides her step-father, Maurice Kallstrom, who now resides at Gold Hill, Miss Anderson leaves three sisters, Gale and Nancy Tritch of Grass Valley, Calif., Winifred Tritch of Jackson, Calif., an uncle, Andrew Rudberg of Grants Pass, Ore., and a brother-in-law, W. E. Tritch of Grass Valley, Calif.

She also had two sisters, Edith Anderson, who passed away in infancy at Telluride, Colo., and Lillie Tritch, who passed away at Grass Valley, Calif., in 1917.

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LEGION REQUESTS CITY PAY HONOR TO CONSTITUTION

Medford Post No. 15, American Legion desires to remind the public that Monday, September 17, 1934, will be the 147th anniversary of the completion and signature of the original draft of Constitution of the United States of America. Pauline Johnson was united in marriage to Ben J. Trowbridge at Eugene, Ore., March 30, 1925, two children being born to the union, Walter Benjamin, aged 3, and Tanya, aged 2 weeks. She also leaves her father, John W. Johnson, all residing at Medford.

Funeral services will be held at the Perl Funeral Home this Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, with Rev. W. R. Baird officiating. Interment will take place in the Siskiyou Memorial park. COPCO PAYMENTS AID TAX FUND

One of the largest tax payments received last week by the tax collection department of the sheriff's office was that of the California Oregon Power company covering the third quarter's payment by the local utility. The total property tax to be paid by the power company in Jackson county this year amounts to \$126,449.67, which is the largest tax in the entire county. The \$126,449.67 to be paid by the California Oregon Power company in 1934 covers only the state, county, city, school and other district property taxes levied against Copco in Jackson county and does not include federal taxes.

The total of property taxes alone to be paid by the California Oregon Power company in the state of Oregon this year will amount to \$350,211.94, according to local officials.

GROWERS TO VISIT TALENT STATION

At 9:00 a. m. Wednesday, September 19, fruitgrowers of the county will have the opportunity to visit the Southern Oregon experiment station, located near Talent on the Pacific highway, and increase their knowledge pertaining to several important orchard problems, states County Agent L. P. Wilcox.

Definite progress has been made in propagating blight resistant stocks, this work will be observed and fully discussed. Little leaf control by means of zinc sulfate will also be noted and the method of treatment described. The results of other experimental work carried on by the station will be brought to the attention of the growers and be ably discussed by Prof. F. C. Reimer.

It is the opinion of the county agent that every fruitgrower in the district will profit greatly by attending this meeting. Growers are asked to be at the station promptly as the appointed time.

GAS CO-OP BUYS HIGHWAY GROUND

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Jackson County Cooperative, the purchase of the cooperative new home was closed. The new location is on the South Pacific highway formerly known as the Airport service station. This piece of property has approximately 400 feet frontage on the Pacific highway and also on the Southern Pacific railway, insuring adequate transportation facilities for this growing concern.

The first unit of the 6000 gallon storage tank is being installed and after Monday the 17th the members will be served from this new plant.
