CHINESE BLAME SUN SPOT FOR THEIR TROUBLES

Old Records Show Drought In Offing When Sol Is Spotted—Willing to Blame Ills On Almost Anything.

ERKINS United Press Staff Correspondent PEIPING, China.—(UP)—With all the world discussing the weather, droughts, floods and heat waves and their causes, the Chinese, willing to blame their troubles on anything at all, are going into the matter of sun spots as being the most likely culprit.

The process has revealed that although they haven't thought much about them for a long time, the Chinese have known about sun spots for a very long time.

The "Tu Shih Chih Ch'eng," one of the greatest sources on Chinese matters historical, relates that sun spots were noted and studied in this land as early as 28 B. C.

There was more discovery and observation in 28 B. C., 188 A. D. and 300 A. D. Between 300 and 1618, 56 observations of sun spots and eight of sun shadows were recorded.

The earliest observers called the sun spots "Hei Tau," or black spots, and they noted what they called "Hei Chih," or black shadows.

Constantly the Chinese observers made a distinction between sun spots and black shadows.

The Chinese, who don't keep their minds on any one thing for any great length of time anyway, were a bit erratic in the observation and study of the sun's antics.

Apparently they got around to noting sun spots and other such phenomena only during periods of intense heat waves.
