

ATHLETIC CLUB FOR BOYS PLAN OF EAGLE LODGE

Constructive Civic Service Will Provide Healthy Physical Recreation for Youngsters From 16 to 21

Establishment of a modern athletic club for boys between the ages of 16 and 21 in Medford is the objective of the local office of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. It is announced by President A. H. Banwell, following the regular meeting of the lodge Friday night.

Jack Hueston, golf professional at the Rogue Valley Golf Club, has been appointed chairman of a committee to investigate the possibilities of the establishment of such a club and reports that he has already received a great deal of encouragement from organizations and individuals.

A Civic Service.

In forming an athletic club it is the belief of the Eagles that a constructive civic service can be performed for the city of Medford by providing healthy physical recreation for the youth of the city. The plans, as discussed at the lodge meeting Friday, are to issue membership cards to boys between the ages of 16 and 21, after they have signed an application form which will call for living up to certain regulations which will be imposed. It is expected that the boys will be taught boxing, wrestling, gymnastics and other athletics under the supervision of men in the city qualified to act as instructors.

The club will be conducted entirely under the direction of the local Eagles lodge, who will select the instructors and others who will be used to see that the club is conducted in a proper and efficient manner.

Burnham to Aid.

Captain G. R. Durham of the Salvation Army has volunteered his services to the committee and his experience along these lines will be of inestimable value in carrying out the purposes for which the club will be organized.

"We believe that our young boys need such a club as we contemplate," stated Mr. Hueston this morning, "and if it is possible for this athletic club to be established in Medford, the Eagles will do it."

Members of the local Eagles were very enthusiastic at the meeting on Friday over this new activity. The club will sponsor and every support will be given Mr. Hueston and the committee in bringing about the desired results.

Great care will be taken when the club is finally arranged for, that boys who are lacking in physical make-up will be given the type of athletics which will build them up physically.

Athletes Volunteer Help.

In discussing the possibility of the club during the meeting, Mr. Hueston stated that many ex-college athletes have volunteered already to help out with instruction and it is felt that once the club is started there will be no shortage of instructors and supervisors to see that it is conducted in the manner for which it is intended.

With a membership of practically 400, the Eagles lodge believes it is this not only to organize the club, but to conduct it during the months to come, and with the encouragement so far received, the committee is hopeful that the club can be brought about within a reasonable time.

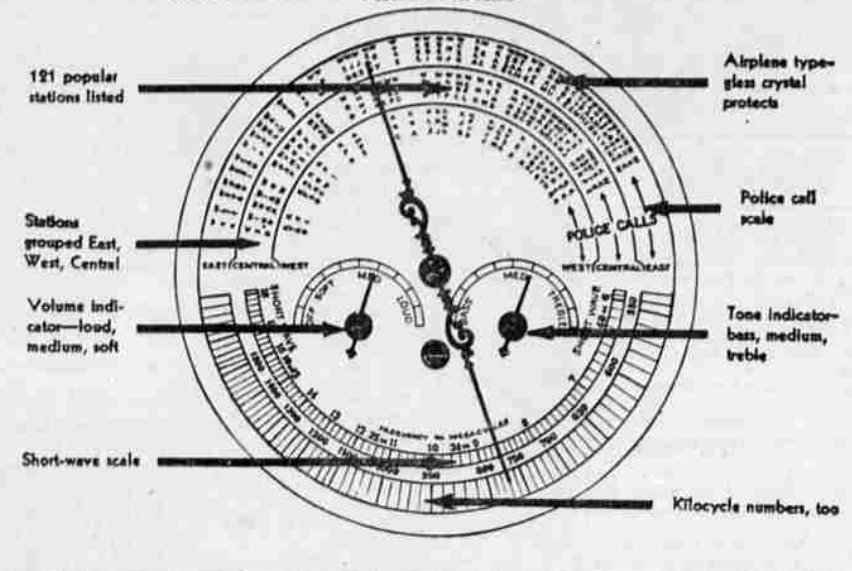

COURT UPHOLDS RIGHT OF ROOSTER TO CROW

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.—(AP)—The court has upheld a rooster's right to crow in this city, irrespective of its effect on a nervous neighbor.

The nervous one appealed to Magistrate S. H. Adams to do something about the cock's noise-making every morning between the hours of 4 and 6.

"My neighbor once had a bantam rooster with a crow like a tin whistle," he complained, "I gave him \$2 for the rooster just to get it out of the way. Then he bought a man-sized rooster with a voice like a fog horn. I can't stand it. I'm a nervous man."

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AUTO DEATHS IN JACKSON COUNTY SHOW DECREASE

Jackson county has reversed the situation effective in the state as a whole with regard to a drastic increase in traffic accident fatalities during the current year, a check of records at the office of Sheriff Walter J. Oimscheld reveal. While figures for Oregon show a 26 per cent increase in auto accident deaths for the first eight months of this year as compared to the same period in 1933 there have been only two traffic fatalities in Jackson county up to September 11 this year, with six recorded for the first eight months of 1933.

Local officials and other sponsors of the statewide "Let's Quit Killing" campaign, including the Parent-Teachers, American Legion, Oregon State Motor association and other groups, point out, however, that there is still wide possibility of improvement of the local accident injury and death record.

HEADMASTER BOYS SCHOOL SLAIN BY MYSTERY KILLER

NORTHFIELD, Mass., Sept. 17.—(AP)—The apparent absence of any possible motive baffled the authorities today in their attempt to track down the slayer of Elliott Spear, 35, headmaster of the Mount Hermon preparatory school for boys.

Spear was shot in the breast while reading in his study Saturday night. A charge of buckshot from a shotgun crashed through a closed window. He fell as his wife rushed into the room.

The crime occurred almost on the eve of the re-opening of the school for the new year, set for this week.

District Attorney Joseph T. Barlett of Greenfield directed the questioning of the faculty of the school, which was founded by Dwight L. Moody, employes in the school buildings and the nearby inn operated as a part of the school enterprise, and residents of the surrounding neighborhood.

The only information bearing directly on the slaying came from Mrs. Constantine George, a maid in the Spear home, and her husband, who is employed at the inn. Mrs. George said that through a window in a flash that accompanied the report of the gun and immediately afterward caught a glimpse of a man running into the nearby woods.

Her husband told the investigators that a short time before the shooting he saw a large closed motor car drive into the school grounds and after the shooting he saw the same car speed out. His description of the automobile, however, was vague.

The investigation extended to the eastern part of the state when it was learned that a former instructor at the school was living in Cambridge. When questioned he could throw no light on the crime.

From the fact that the school is under religious auspices authorities advanced the tentative theory a religious fanatic might have done the shooting.
