

CAMPAIGNING FOR COUNTY OFFICES UNDER SLOW BELL

All the signs indicate the political campaign in Jackson county this fall will be orderly, free from mud slinging, sensational accusations, gossip, or a general war on "rascals" in office. Some voters even fear the campaign will be "dignified" and confined exclusively to handshaking, back-slapping and admiring the farmer's baby.

Outside of rural visiting and fence corner conferences on the taxes, there has been little campaigning. H. D. (Johnny) Reed, Democratic candidate for county judge, and Syd Brown, Democratic nominee for sheriff, have both been meeting the folks for several weeks. So far this has been about the extent of the activity of the candidates.

Commissioner Emmett Nealon reports that Oliver Caster, of Phoenix, his Democratic rival, had conferred with him on campaign tactics and it was agreed neither would say anything mean about the other. They tentatively agreed that they would "move around and visit" but no more. Commissioner Nealon said he might exhibit the hide of the coyote he killed last spring with a well heaved rock, and produce an affidavit he had not yet collected the bounty thereon.

County Judge Earl B. Day and Sheriff Walter J. Olmscheid, Republican nominees, have not yet girded their loins for the tussle.

The interest in the gubernatorial contest is not much more than all. A few ardent supporters of Dunne, Zimmerman and Martin are browsing about saying nice things about their favorites, but the voters are nonchalant and not taking politics seriously.

It is now predicted that the situation will commence to hum about October 15, and from that date until election day, the fur and works will fly.

A. C. HUBBARD NAMED TO AID IN DRAFTING BUDGET FOR COUNTY

A. C. Hubbard, pioneer and widely known business man of this city, was today named by County Judge Earl B. Day as third member of the budget committee. Mr. Hubbard accepted the appointment, after he was able to arrange his personal affairs so he could serve.

The budget committee will be composed of W. J. Freeman of Central Point, selected by Commissioner R. E. Nealon; State Senator George W. Dunn of Ashland, selected by Commissioner Ralph S. Billings, and Hubbard, selected by County Judge Day.

All the appointed members of the budget committee are well known, and through long residence and experience, are thoroughly conversant with all Jackson county values, conditions, and tax problems. Hubbard is well acquainted with farm, orchard and business conditions. Freeman the same, and Senator Dunn is a former county judge.

The county court sits with the three appointees as the budget committee.

First session of the budget committee will be held next week, date as yet undetermined. Under Oregon law, the budget must be completed by November 1, after which a public hearing will be called for discussion of the budget.

STINSON EARNING HONORS IN NAVY

Don has been selected "honor man" at the school, according to word received by the Mail Tribune today from his commanding officer, Commander F. J. Lowry, of the training school.

The designation "honor man," according to Lowry, means that his work was outstanding in a group of approximately one hundred and fifty-six men in his company. Honor men are selected because of their neat personal appearance, initiative, and their ability to profit from instruction received during their recruit training.

While in the local high school, Stinson was a student of exceptional merit.

SALEM STRIKERS CREATE TROUBLE

SALEM, Sept. 20—(AP)—As the result of a slight disturbance Wednesday, strikers who had been picketing the Thomas Kay woolen mills plant here, were told by Earl Kay, chief owner, this morning, that they might remain on the grounds only, "if they caused no further trouble."

Assistance of local police was required yesterday, when pickets refused to leave the plant and remove their bolts of cloth. When police arrived, the strikers refused to disperse.
