

### MEDICAL SOCIETY AIR PROBLEMS AT BANQUET MEETING

Dr. William F. Honey was host at a dinner meeting of the Jackson County Medical Society held Wednesday night at Dur'lell's, at which the paper of the evening was read by R. D. M. Brower of Ashland. Discussions on community medical problems were held, with 24 doctors taking part.

Dr. A. F. W. Krasse, president, was chosen to represent Jackson county at the State Medical Society's convention, to be held the latter part of next week at Corvallis. Others to attend from the Medford society will be Dr. L. D. Inskip, Dr. James C. Hayes and Dr. William P. Holt. It was announced by Dr. Charles T. Sweeney, Dr. Sweeney will leave tonight with Dr. Hayes to attend a meeting at Newport tomorrow of the medical societies of the Willamette valley.

Followed by an enlightening discussion from Dr. Hayes, Dr. Sweeney and Rev. William J. Howell, who was a guest at the meeting, Dr. Brower's paper was on the subject, "The Origin and History of Law." The talks, which dealt with the betterment of health laws in Jackson county, proved most interesting to all present.

Other discussions were on the care of county indigents, on the service of hospitals in the community, and on the fall's business and social activities. A question was also brought up on a ruling against graduate nurses assisting osteopaths in the hospitals, and whether or not doctors practicing this branch of medicine should use the hospital's laboratory facilities and x-ray equipment.

Dr. C. I. Drummond, county doctor, also gave a talk on the county health department. Drs. E. A. Woods and Bernard G. Barkwill of Ashland were named delegates to the state convention from their city. Besides Rev. Howell, Dr. Mary Jane Rochelle was also a guest of the society.

A letter of resignation was read to the group from Dr. D. A. Forbes, vice-president, who formerly resided in Eagle Point. Dr. F. G. Thayer was elected to fill the vacancy. Dr. Forbes has recently moved to Happy Camp, Cal., where he is engaged in medical work connected with the Civilian Conservation corps.

As a token of appreciation for his five years of service in the club, a fine fountain pen was sent to E. W. Shockey, who recently resigned from his position of secretary. Dr. Shockey was formerly an x-ray specialist, and is now in the real estate business. A letter of remembrance was addressed to the former club member, accompanying the gift.
