

# ASHLAND GRIDMEN TACKLE DUNSMUIR ELEVEN SATURDAY

ASHLAND, Sept. 21.—(Spl.)—The longest schedule in history—that's what Don Faber's Ashland high school gridmen will inaugurate Saturday, when they tangle with Dunsmuir high in the dedication game of Ashland's reconditioned athletic field which now takes its place as the finest in Southern Oregon.

Eleven games are on the slate for the Lithians during the coming season, including the three conference affairs with Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls.

With nine lettermen forming the nucleus for the 1934 team, Faber will start a team against Dunsmuir with a weight average of nearly 160 pounds, most of it in the line. The back field, which will be fast and experienced, will, however, be light, averaging 145 pounds.

In the neighborhood of 35 have been reporting for practice of late. Lineup for the opening game is as follows: Ends, Shillings, Bell or Bailey; tackles, Pratt and Weybright; guards, Moore, Bromley, Jackson or Edwards; center, Jungwirth or Davis; quarterback, Hoxie; halfbacks, Kanast and Hall and fullback, Wallin.

public or to notify the police. "The child is in gut care."

"Indication (editor's note: intended for "identification") for our letters are signature—

"Below the interlocking circle symbol. The circles may have been drawn around a coin the size of a quarter. The symbol had been pierced in three places by a fine point. "At the bottom of the note was a continuation of the final sentence regarding the signature, reading "and 3 holes." The emphasis on the three holes served to heighten interest in them by investigators, who found that

all succeeding notes bore the same kind of holes in exactly the same relation to each other, geometrically."
