HUNTING SUCCESS REPORTED BY FEW IN NEARBY AREAS

Successful deer hunters of the last few days were Pete Toekan, Charlie Bentley, Gus Roaches and Lewis Thano, who returned Friday night from Falls valley, southeast of Dog lake. The party brought back three bucks. Vernon Brophy also brought in a deer Friday, and Karl Jannouch, supervisor of Rogue River National Forest, reports that while on an extended trip through his territory, he saw Ralph Watson's brother-in-law, a fire guard at Hammacker, bring down a four-pointer a half hour after the season opened.

Many of the deer slayers in southern Oregon are still in the hills looking for deer to slay, and are not expected to report back until Saturday night or Sunday, but more fortunate were Fred Christine of South Oakdale, who tagged a buck on Parker mountain yesterday, and John Marden of Gold Hill, who dressed in a 151-pound blacktail at Hubbard Brothers' store this morning. Marden got the deer above Ashland Thursday.

Applegate CCC patrolmen reported 100 cars entering the forests in the vicinity of their camps the day before the season opened. Of this number 25 were hunters and the others were residents of the district or others on business there. The vehicles were stopped and a report taken on the reason for entering the forest. All hunters were cautioned to exercise the utmost care to prevent fires.

When the forest service called upon CCC men to be used as patrolmen on all roads leading into the national forests during the opening of the hunting season, Camp Applegate responded not only with men but with forest signs.

The Applegate educational department went to work a few minutes after the order was received and turned out 16 road signs to be used at the entrances to the forests.

FIGHTNER 25 YRS. IN BUSINESS HERE COMING THURSDAY

Carl Fichtner, owner and operator of Fichtner's Garage, Sixth and Fir street next Thursday, September 27, will celebrate 25 years of continuous business in this city. As a token of the event, Mr. Fichtner will give to each autoist calling next Thursday at his place of business, a can of auto polish. He is the oldest tire repair man, in point of service in business here.

Fichtner started business in the alley back of what was then the "Moore Hotel," in 1909 and is now the owner of a large storage garage, and general tire, auto and tire repair and auto accessory business. He also

had quarters over Merriman's blacksmith shop, on South Grape street, and in the building now used as a California Oregon Power company garage. He then moved to Fir street, about the time the use of autos became general, and punctures became prevalent. He did a rushing business there for several years, and repaired tires, and changed them, while the autoists waited in the street. Ten years ago, increased business resulted in his moving to his present quarters, where a 24-hour service is maintained.

During his 25 years of tire repairing, etc., Fichtner has removed many old articles from punctured tires, and these—quite a considerable pile—will also be on display.

FAILURE TO STOP AFTER ACCIDENT COSTS SWEET \$5

In a case in justice court this morning against L. M. Sweet of Sams Valley, who was arraigned on charges of reckless driving, charges were reduced to "failing to stop at the place of accident." Sweet was arrested by state police after he figured in a minor accident near Beagle, and did not report to police. He was fined \$5 and costs before Justice of the Peace W. H. Coleman.

Wm. Prechabat, 56, of route 1, paid costs in justice court on charges of operating a four-wheel trailer with improper license.

Ralph Mardin Proctor, 32, of Drew, Ore., was fined \$5 and costs yesterday in justice court, having been arrested by state police for operating a motor vehicle with one red light.

City Judge Allen Curry was also busy today, hearing six cases of drunkenness in city court. They were against Charles Bell, a transient giving his address as Pennsylvania, who was ordered out of town; Wm. Cogswill of this city, who plead not guilty and will appear for trial at 4 p. m. today, and Jewell Wattenburg, 36, of Colorado, Lewis Verschoor, 37, of this city all of whom were fined \$10, Jones having forfeited cash bail set at that amount.
