

JOE DUNNE OPENS VALLEY CAMPAIGN FOR GOP MONDAY

Gubernatorial Candidate to Make Eight Speeches in Three Days On Rogue River Valley Visit.

The Republicans of Jackson county are looking forward to the opening of their campaign in southern Oregon at Ashland Monday evening, September 24, in the city hall at Ashland followed by a meeting in the Grand hall in Central Point Tuesday evening, September 25, at 8 p. m., when Mr. Dunne will discuss farm problems, specially, and the meeting in the city park at Medford Wednesday evening, September 26, at 8 p. m.

These meetings will be addressed by Joe E. Dunne, republican nominee for governor, who will discuss state issues and make his position clear on them, so the people will know what to expect if he is elected governor.

He will be accompanied to southern Oregon by Arthur Prieux, chairman of the republican state committee and Captain C. F. (Cicero) Hogan, a world war veteran, who is representing the Veterans Voters' league. These men will have a message to veterans of all wars and the public generally.

During the three days Mr. Dunne and party will visit service clubs as follows, and make short talks: Monday noon, Klamath; Tuesday noon, Medford; Tuesday evening at 6:30, Active club at Hotel Medford (this meeting will be out at 7:45 for Mr. Dunne address the meeting in Central Point); Wednesday morning at 8 a. m., breakfast with Jackson County Insurance Men's Association at Hotel Medford; Wednesday noon, Lions.

There will be a band concert by the Elks' band in the city park at 7:30 p. m., Wednesday evening preceding this meeting. An amplifier will make it possible for everyone to hear the music and address, whether in the cars or in the seats that will be provided in the park.

Speaking of Mr. Dunne, Frank Farrell, chairman of the county committee says: "Joe Dunne as state senator from Multnomah county for eight years, has taken an important part in framing Oregon legislation (being father of the \$5 automobile license law) and having been a resident of Oregon for a number of years, a successful business man and taxpayer, who has made his own way from boyhood, and having always been a close student of public affairs, he has gained an intimate knowledge of the wants of all classes of people and of public affairs that specially fits him for governor."

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MILK PRODUCERS, MARKET DEALERS TO MEET MONDAY

Milk dealers, producers and all others connected with the market milk business in Jackson and Josephine counties will meet at the court house auditorium tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. E. O. Harlan, chairman of the Oregon state milk control board, with headquarters in Portland, and Burge W. Mason of Klamath Falls, member of the board, will be in charge of the meeting.

Mr. Harlan and Mr. Mason will speak before the gathering, as will Frank Van Dyke, president of the local organization of dairymen, whose subject will be the present situation regarding the Medford district.

Qualifications of dairymen who wish to get into the milk marketing business will be investigated and paying of monthly fees will be checked. The organization stated that some dairymen are lax in making these payments.

Mr. Harlan, who has been in Medford for the past few days to attend the mining congress meeting, seems much pleased with the milk business in this district, and says that it has shown an increase throughout the entire state during the past few months.

Funeral services for the late Dr. Frederick C. Page will be held at the First Lutheran church this (Sunday) afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Father E. S. Baillan of St. Mark's Episcopal church officiating. Interment will take place in the Siskiyou Memorial Park.

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MINING CONGRESS NAMES DR. SMITH OF OREGON CHIEF

University Geologist Honored—State-Wide Mine Development Program Favored—Lydiard Speaks

Dr. Warren B. Smith, University of Oregon geologist, was elected president of the Oregon Mining Congress at the annual state convention held in the court house auditorium yesterday by an attendance of 125 delegates from all parts of the state. B. K. Lawson, Portland chief of police, was re-elected vice-president, and E. G. Harlan of Eugene was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

President Smith, who succeeds R. M. Betts of Eugene, addressed the congress in the afternoon session on a comprehensive statewide program for mining development, and Prof. J. H. Batcher of the Oregon State college mining department spoke on the work of the Pacific Northwest Research Institute as it applies to mining.

The morning session was devoted to an executive meeting at which time a six-point program for the coming year's work was presented. A special legislative committee, with Mr. Lawson as chairman, was appointed to present a legislative program to the mining committees of the house of representatives and senate at the next state legislature.

The next convention of the mining congress will be held at Salem in the first week of January, 1935. W. H. Lydiard of Medford, member of the state mining board, appointed by Governor Meier, spoke on the value of the mining industry during the depression in providing work for hundreds of men who might otherwise have been unemployed.

"During the depression," he said, "miners produced payroll while other industries failed. Hundreds of people were able to pay their rent and buy food through money they obtained by prospecting." He added that if the important business men of a community had a real understanding of mining and its possibilities, the industry could be developed far more rapidly than under present conditions.

Albert Burch, also of Medford, former member of the state mining board, also talked, discussing the natural conditions under which mining men in Oregon work, hampered by topographical ruggedness and inaccessibility of much of the state's mineral property.

An inventory of all the existing mineral resources of the state will be taken, it was decided on the executive session, which also made provisions for a mineral and geological survey of the state as another part of its six-point program. The congress pledged its support to the Pacific Northwest Research Institute, which is conducted by the federal government with Marshall Dana of Portland at its head.

State and federal subsidies for deserting and approved mineral prospects were discussed and provisions made for field service and mine inspection throughout the state. It was also decided to form a mining board to approve stock selling permits before they are issued by the corporation department.

Resolutions passed at the convention were as follows: "1. That the board of higher education be thanked for making available the services of Professor Batcher as secretary of the state mining board."

"2. That the congress go on record as making a list of approved assayers in the state, and that a list of reliable ones be furnished."

"3. That the congress advocate the repeal of the present 40-day lien law."

"4. That there be a reduction of freight rates on ore and concentrates, as present rates retard the development of the mining industry."

"5. That funds from state vocational education be provided for mining instruction work, such as panning, etc., and for field service."

"6. That highway bonds—county, state and federal—be asked to aid in building roads to inaccessible mining properties."
