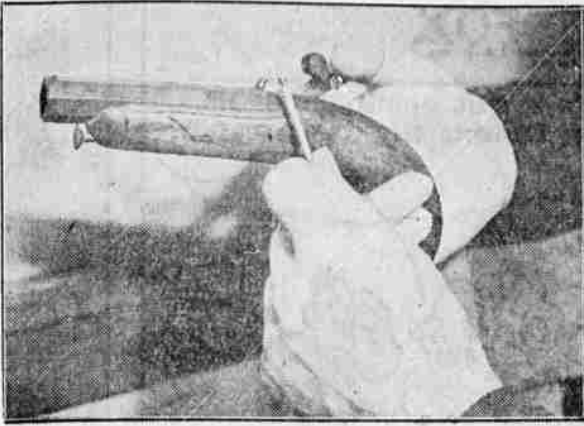


ACCIDENTAL SHOT FATAL TO SINGER

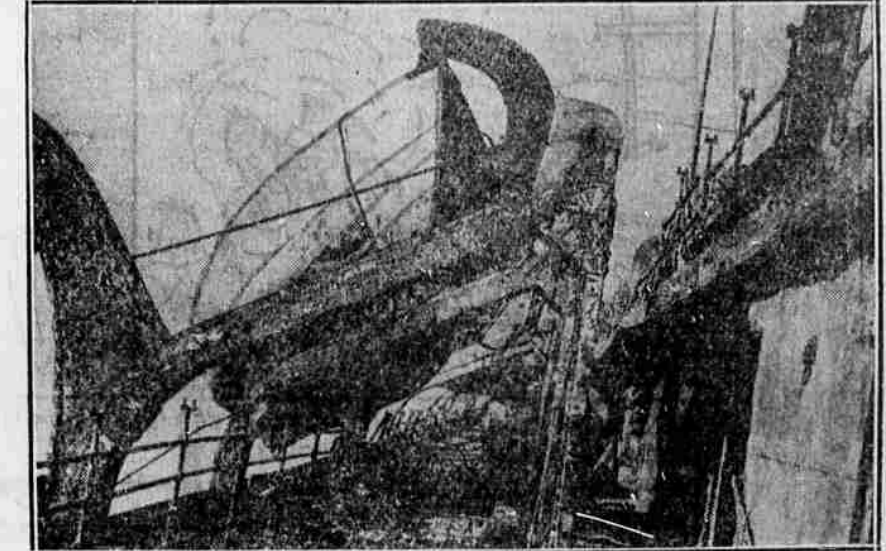
SHIP OFFICERS GRILLED IN SEA DISASTER QUIZ



Startling disclosures filled the testimony in the department of commerce inquiry at New York into the disaster which cost the lives of some 130 persons aboard the liner Morro Castle. Elen S. Abbott (left), chief engineer of the ship, is shown as he took the oath before testifying. 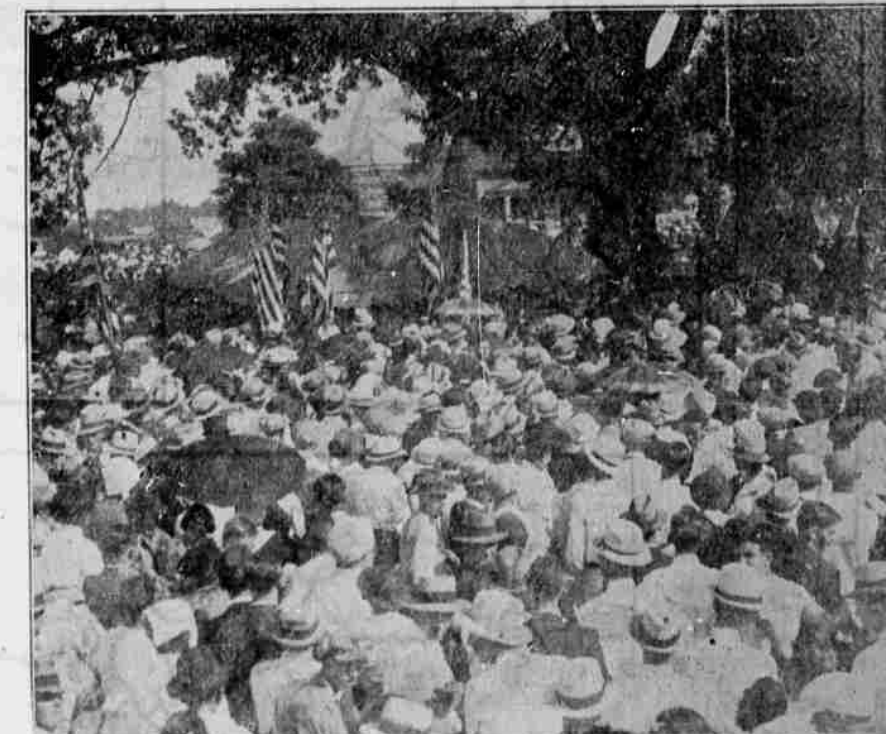
