### TOMATOES NIPPED BY FIRST FROSTS

Tips of the tomato plants at the Southern Oregon Experiment station, were damaged by last night's frost, according to report today from Prof. F. C. Reimer of the station, located near Talent. The minimum temperature was recorded there as 21 degrees he said. Cucumber and melon vines, close to the ground were also injured by the frost, Mr. Reimer said, but because the crops are ripe, very little damage was suffered. The Medford weather bureau, located at the airport, reported a minimum of 34 degrees, but Professor Reimer stated that the positions of the shelters made the difference in recording. The local shelter is on top of the airport building, while the one at the experiment station is on a stand about four feet from the ground, he said. A slight frost was reported Monday evening by Mr. Reimer, who said that it was of no consequence, as none of the plants were damaged. The county agent's office had not received reports yet this afternoon on crops damaged by the frost.

### GEO. T. MUSGROVE TYPHOID VICTIM

George Thomas Musgrove, aged 50 years, passed away at a local hospital September 24 after a short illness of typhoid. He had been working at Lakewood and was brought to Medford last Sunday. Yesterday he visited the sites of his childhood in Salem and in Newberg.

With Governor Julius L. Meier, an ardent fisherman, ex-President Hoover was to try his luck in the salmon waters of the upper Columbia this afternoon. Last night he was a guest of Governor and Mrs. Meier at their country place, Menucha, on the Columbia. United States Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon, minority floor leader, and others were there.

## PROBLEMS OF FARM DISCUSSED BY DUNNE CENTRAL POINT MEET

At a well attended meeting in the Orange Hall at Central Point last evening, Senator Joe E. Dunne, Republican candidate for governor, spoke on farm problems and other topics of interest to local citizens. He outlined a program of more up-to-date marketing of farm products that he believed would again put the farmer on the economic plane to which he is entitled, and told how measures he had introduced or supported in the legislature had saved hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to the dairy industry in this state, principally through better marketing practices enforced thereby and the senator expressed himself as convinced that similar improved marketing facilities should be of equal benefit to other branches of the farming industry. The speaker advocated a scientific survey of the whole state, to properly study its commercial and farm problems and suggested that such survey would doubtless disclose a profitable method of disposing of the by-products of orchards and farms of this vicinity. He reasserted his determination to use every influence at his command if elected governor, to straighten out our highway over the Siskiyou mountains and to the north, to the end that it might save to this section of
