REVAMPED SQUAD MINUS SERVICES MANY MAINSTAYS

Leo Ghelardi Will Probably Bark Signals—Coach Burgher Says Boys in Good Shape for Opening Battle

"Come on ye SONS!" So says the Medford high Tigers. It will be "Come on, ye SONS!" and "Come, ye Tigers!" when the S. O. N. S. freshmen meet the Medford high Tigers here tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock on Van Scoyoc field.

When the Tigers take the field they will be without the services of some of their old mainstays, namely, Tom White, quarterback; Max Gillinsky, halfback; Lloyd Hamman, center; Bill Prentice, guard, and Ed Bennett. It has been hard for Coach D. K. Burgher to find substitutes for this quintet, but he has been constantly on the alert and has been giving a few of his boys a tryout for the positions left open.

Ghelardi to Call Signals.
Little "Leaping Leo" Ghelardi will probably be at the signal calling post, with Bill Bates at full, "Blondie" Lewis at left half, and Kase Brown at the other halfback position. The forward wall will probably be composed of Hinman and Pierce, ends; Dickinson and Baker, guards; Kindred and Fowler, tackles, and Stewart, center. Keith Estes, a young Tarzan who has been working until a few days ago, will probably see action. Estes came out for practice the first time Thursday night.

The Tigers have been working diligently for the past two weeks, in preparation for their opening contest, and tomorrow's game will be a real test of their ability as well as of their coach's ability. According to Coach Burgher, his boys are in excellent shape for the game.

Fresh Confident.
Reports from the Normal school campus indicate that the Frosh are confident they will win from the Tigers.
Coach Hobson of the Normal school has the largest turnout of football candidates in the history of the school. He has four full teams on the practice field every night, and has a little more than two full teams of freshmen candidates, according to information received last night. Hobson has not announced his starting line-up.

The freshmen team is composed mostly of ex-Ashland and ex-Medford high school football players, with representatives of various high schools in the state also on the team.
The football games of Medford high have been particularly interesting from the fans' standpoint, because of the student spirit displayed at every game.

CARDINALS HAVE OPPORTUNITY TO TIE FOR PENNANT

The Cardinals had an opportunity today they had been looking forward to ever since they began their National league pennant drive—by winning one game they could tie the Giants for the lead and make it an even race through the last two days of the season.

A hard won 8-to-5 triumph over the last-place Cincinnati Reds yesterday left the Cards only a half game behind the league leaders, who were idle.
Today the Giants still were inactive while the Cards sought a second victory over the Reds that would put them on exactly even terms, each with 93 victories and 58 defeats and two games to go.

After that triumph there would remain for St. Louis the matter of beating the Reds twice more to assure at least a tie for the flag while the Giants encounter two games against the Brooklyn Dodgers.

The Cards were in imminent danger of blowing themselves out of the struggle at one stage of yesterday's contest after the opening nervousness of Gordon Blagden had handed them five runs in the first inning. Bill Walker, the club's leading southpaw, wobbled around until the Reds nearly tied the score. After Walker was removed, Dazzy Vance was touched up a bit in the sixth and Red rallies were stopped only after the count had reached 8-4. The removal of Reller Hurler Tony Freitas changed the aspect, however, for the Cards got to St. Johnson for a couple of runs and won going away.

BELCASTRO BACKWARD ABOUT TAKING MATCH WITH BOB KENASTON

Manuel Syta, 147, of Callahan, defeated Zack Moore, 145, of Indian creek in a fast slugging match. Henry Thompson, 154, Oak Knoll, and Bob Trometter, 162, Hill, were given a popular draw after they had fought it out toe-to-toe through four heated stanzas.

Billie Limer, 137, Indian Creek, was given the nod over Kermit Foster, 139, South Fork, in the semi-final contest. The much-touted Smith of Wine-

Clegg, light but with plenty of drive, is filling the fullback position vacated last year by Luman.

With Ettinger's triple-threat blocking, kicking and ball carrying, and battering-rams such as Gates and Wall in the center position, the line and backfield are well balanced.

After taking two trimmings from seventh place Portland, San Francisco came to life to trounce the Beavers, 13-1.

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
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
