

### WOULD BAR BATES FROM INTERFERING WITH MINE SALE

An order "forever enjoining" F. A. Bates and his daughter, Margaret Bates Lund, from "interfering in the sale of the Black Channel," is sought by Jacob F. Lund, in an answer to the suit filed by Margaret Bates Lund, his wife, in a suit to revoke the sale of the Black Channel mine. The property has figured in the litigation and turmoil of Jackson county for the past three years.

Lund also denies the charge in the complaint, that he engaged in "a conspiracy to cheat F. A. Bates out of the property" but, instead, claims he advanced funds to thwart a sale by the sheriff, and secured a buyer who advanced sufficient down payment to redeem the property.

The defendant further denies that he is "entrusted by his wife," but says she is "dominated by her father," and due to this influence will not longer abide with him.

Lund charges that money he sent for the support of his wife, while she was in Linn county, "was in some manner procured by Bates, and used by him to come to Medford and use every means possible to cause the defendant trouble."

The claim is also advanced by Lund that he procured funds to pay the labor liens incurred by L. A. Banks, while attempting to operate the property, and Bates nor his wife ever advanced funds to save the property, or paid attention to the legal summons issued in the various actions against the property.

Besides the eternal restraining order, Lund asks for dismissal of the case, and the assessment of costs to the plaintiff.

### GOLD HILL SHOWS GAIN IN SCHOOLS

GOLD HILL, Sept. 28.—(Spl.)—Enrollment in the Gold Hill schools, on a basis of checked figures released by Supt. J. A. Thomson this week, showed a gain of 19 pupils over the

enrollment of the first few days of the term or an increase of 43 over last year. There are now 177 students in the grades and 70 in high school.

STREAMLINED PULLMAN TRAIN

CHICAGO — (UP) — A Pullman-equipped streamlined passenger train, the first of its kind in America, soon is to be put in operation between Chicago and the Pacific coast.

This new six-car train, built by the Union Pacific Railroad company, is similar in design to the three-car unit built by the company several months ago and now on exhibition at the Chicago World's Fair.

The addition of sleeping facilities to the high speed train was expected by company officials to save a full business day between here and the coast.

Constructed of an aluminum alloy, the weight of the new train will be 200 tons, as compared to the 700 tons of a corresponding steel steam train. It will be powered by a 900 horsepower Diesel engine, which will pull the locomotive car, a mail-baggage car, three Pullman sleepers and a coach-buffet car.

Sixty-eight passengers will be afforded sleeping accommodations in ultra-modern berths. Each berth has a collapsible wash bowl, illuminated mirror and is enclosed at night with a sliding aluminum panel. There are adjustable reading lights. A folding stairway provides easy access to upper berths.

The buffet coach, with seating capacity for 56, is the last car of the unit. The kitchen is located in the finlike tail of the rear car and from there meals will be served directly to the seated diners.
