The first meeting of the Women's Missionary Federation was held in the Baptist church Friday afternoon, with Mrs. George Kabele, the president, in charge. She offered the invocation and Mrs. E. E. Wilson, president of the Baptist Ladies' Missionary society, extended greetings to the visiting societies on behalf of the Baptist group. Mrs. A. J. Hanby responded with a brief message of appreciation.

During the business session, minutes of the organization meeting held in February during the World Day of Prayer, were read, and Mrs. Weatherford was elected vice-president to fill the vacancy caused by the moving to Portland of Mrs. LaRose.

The newly framed constitution of the federation was read and its adoption will be made at the next World Day of Prayer in February.

The ladies of the Missionary society of the First Christian church presented the program, with Mrs. Fred J. Wilmut, president, in charge. She gave a brief outline of the work in that church for the past sixty years, and Mrs. W. R. Baird gave devotions, choosing for her scripture lesson, Matthew 5:12-14 and Hebrews 12:1-2.
