FINAL MEET FOR EAGLES BOY CLUB PLANS WEDNESDAY

A meeting of boys between the ages of 14 and 21 will be held next Wednesday evening at 7:30 at the Eagles' lodge for the purpose of completing plans for the organization of an athletic club, it was announced by Jack Hueston yesterday.

A similar meeting was held last Wednesday, at which time about 25 boys were present, and objectives of the athletic club were explained by representatives of the Eagles. A number of persons interested in boys' welfare work were present and expressed pleasure that the Eagles' lodge would sponsor such a movement in this city.

It will be the purpose of the Eagles to organize immediately three groups of basketball teams and possibly other athletic groups. The groups will, in all probability, be allocated to the east, west and southern portions of the city, directly arrangements have been made for floors upon which the boys can play basketball.

Coach Burgher of the Medford high school, who attended last Wednesday's meeting, stated that the project being sponsored by the Eagles was the finest that could be developed in this city, as it kept the boys active, provided healthy recreation and had a tendency to build character and leadership.

Larry Schade, who for many years has been vitally concerned in boys' welfare work in this city, stated that it was the biggest thing that could happen here and was something that he had hoped for many years would be brought about.

Capt. G. R. Durham of the Salvation Army, who also attended the meeting, pledged his co-operation, as it has been a dream of his ever since he came to Medford.

Many officers of the Eagles' lodge gave short talks, including George Tucker, the chaplain of the local serie, who organized a similar project in British Columbia when he was bayonet and physical instructor in the Canadian army.

A number of the boys present expressed pleasure that such a club was being organized, and Jack Hueston, who acted as chairman, appointed from the boys a committee of three to work with the Eagles' committee.

Those selected were: Alva Merritt, Ray Offert and Price Shaffer.

It had been previously announced by the Eagles that the ages for membership would be 14 to 21, but this was changed at the meeting to 14 to 21. It is expected that a bigger group of boys will be present Wednesday, when all the details in connection with the proposed organization will be thoroughly explained and set in motion.
