GRANTS PASS, Oct. 2.—(Sp.)—Stepping ahead in the sixth inning to win, 5-3, Ken Williams' Grants Pass Merchants Sunday took high over Hal Haight's Medford Rogues. This game in a way settled a tie score that resulted three weeks ago from a 14-inning game played between these two teams. Hal Haight won, Haight was ready to claim the privilege of taking his team to Portland, there to play the Blits Weinhart team for the state semi-pro championship if possible. He had announced that he would claim the district championship for the force of this game, despite the fact that the Merchants had already won the Southern Oregon league pennant. This season Grants Pass has won six games from the Rogues; tied them once and lost to them twice. Medford's greatly revamped team, which on September 9 enabled them to tie Grants Pass, 1-1, in 14 innings, gave them such confidence that they were almost positive of taking the Merchants "into camp."
