By PAUL MALLON. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 5.—Life's most embarrassing moment for the silver enthusiasts came the other day when China walked in and protested strongly against our silver policy.

Since then, the new deal advisers, who are responsible for the administration accepting this policy, have been very, very uncomfortable. They are supposed to be searching for a rearrangement in the policy, while it may be announced soon, if one can be found.

Otherwise, the administration may get some new silver advisers. A protest from China is not in itself a world-shaking development.

No one here disputes China's contention that the silver policy is hurting her. She can buy more with higher silver values, but can sell less.

Behind the current triumphant American tour of this Chinese general, Tsai Ting-Kai, there seems to be a somewhat indefinite idea that he may soon become the ruler of China.

The Japanese laughed when General Billy Mitchell announced we could destroy Japan with a fleet of say 40 dirigibles. That made it unanimous.

The Howell committee, before which Mitchell made his statement, even listened, itself. So did the spectators, most of whom were technical aviation experts.

Every time the brilliant air enthusiast opens his mouth a sensation comes out, but no newspaper would hire him as a cub reporter because he has a habit of letting his enthusiasm lead him into exaggerations.

One thing which is behind all this aviation and battleship hoopla is that the administration now is making up its budget for next year.

'BEANED' DIZZY ON MOUND TODAY TO RETRIEVE HONORS

Ace Hurler Unhurt and Confident of Winning — Struck On Head Ball Bounds High — Story of Cardinal Rout

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The red badge of courage flared like a beacon in the fighting hearts of the St. Louis Cardinals tonight as they accepted defeat and soberly reflected the close escape of their star of stars, Dizzy Dean.

Those Cardinals had been nearly clawed to pieces by the growling Bengal Tiger, suffering their worst licking in a month, yet, they were grinning and supremely confident they would triumph in the end.

Frankie Frisch, leader of the Cardinals, accepted the defeat with a smile. "What's there to say?" he asked. "We simply got the hell beat out of us. That's all there is to it."

Dean, knocked unconscious when Billy Rogell, Tiger shortstop, hit him in the head with a vicious throw when Dean came charging into second base, will pitch for the Cardinals tomorrow, according to Frisch.

Dean was taken to a hospital by Dr. Robert F. Hyland for an X-ray examination merely as a precautionary measure. He said Dean was not seriously injured and showed no ill-effects except a big headache.

After Dean had been carried off the field, he was placed in bed in the dressing room, his head packed in ice. Later he went to the hospital with his wife for the examination.

The Tiger onslaught was led by two players who had been under critical fire because of their previous shortcomings—Billy Rogell, the limping shortstop, and big Hank Greenberg, first baseman. Rogell slugged home four runs, as he came through twice with base-hits while the bags were loaded.

NO AUTHORITY IN RECOVERY ACT FOR FIXING OF PRICES

Federal Courts of Two States Hand Down Rulings Against Motor and Lumber Code Price Provisions

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Intimation of his belief that the NRA retail motor code is only a link in the "national usurpation of state rights" was expressed today by Federal Judge Edgar S. HAUPTMANN SEEN PROWLING BRUSH ON LINDY ESTATE

Farmer Identifies Prisoner as Man He Saw Near Hopewell Before Abduction — Faith of Wife Unshaken

By Francis A. Jamieson (Associated Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Bruno Richard Hauptmann was identified today by a former neighbor of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh as a man he had seen emerging from underbrush on the Lindbergh estate near Hopewell, N. J., a few weeks before the aviator's infant son was kidnaped.

Whited picked the German carpenter, held on a charge of extorting from a \$50,000 Lindbergh ransom, from a lineup of 10 men at the Bronx county courthouse.

When Hauptmann was arrested, the farmer was sought immediately. He was located only two days ago.

Simultaneously it was announced Colonel Lindbergh will be one of 23 witnesses before the Hamilton county grand jury at Flemington, N. J., Monday, when Hauptmann's indictment on kidnaping and murder charges will be asked.

Four guards were present for the 10-minute meeting, at the end of which Mrs. Hauptmann reaffirmed her belief that her husband is innocent.

For a minute after I dumped her was innocent," she said. "I am more firmly convinced than ever. You see, I have found out a lot of things since they arrested him.
