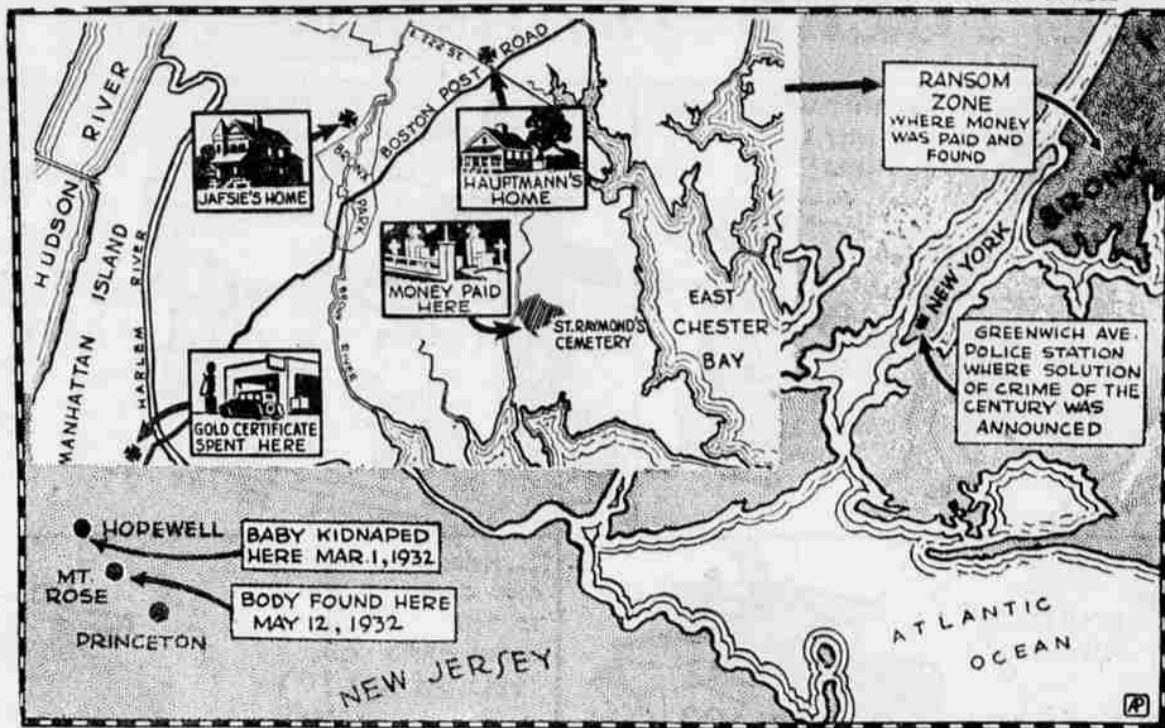


Democrats Choose Him for Rainey Seat

MAP SHOWS STRATEGIC SPOTS IN LINDY BABY KIDNAPING CASE



Locations in and around metropolitan New York that have figured prominently in the Lindbergh baby kidnaping case and its possible solution as a result of the arrest of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, fugitive German, are shown graphically in this Associated Press map. In the upper left is a closeup of the ransom zone where the \$50,000 ransom was paid and where part of the money was recovered at Hauptmann's home. The diagram of the filling station indicates where Hauptmann was finally detected as he passed one of the marked gold notes.

ARRAIGN LINDY KIDNAPING SUSPECT FOR EXTORTION



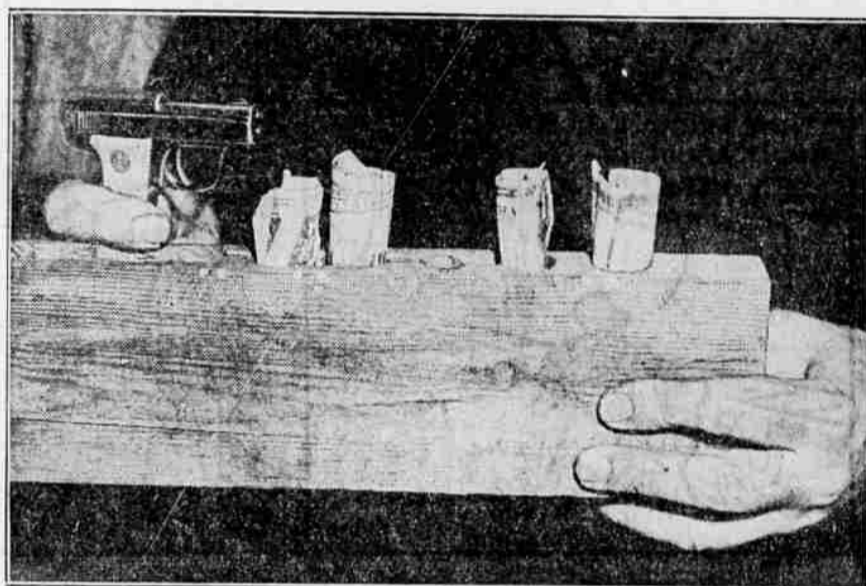

ATTRACT SCIENTIFIC INTEREST



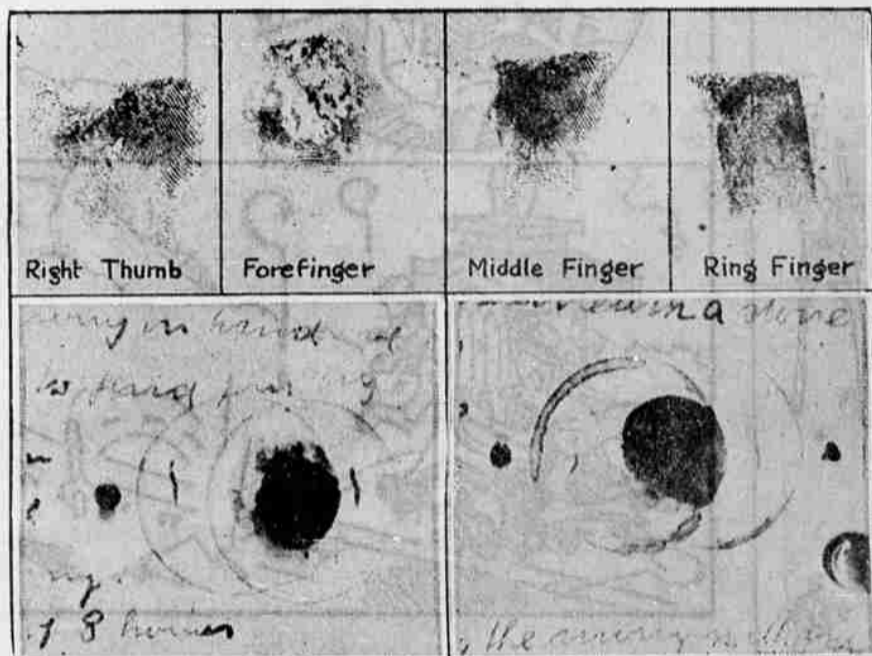

MORE LINDY RANSOM MONEY FOUND IN GARAGE PLANK



Further evidence in the case against Bruno Richard Hauptmann, indicted for extortion in the Lindbergh kidnaping, was discovered in these four holes, bored in a plank in the suspect's garage. Police found \$840 in bills, later identified as part of the ransom money, stuffed in the receptacles. The money pictures above is not that found by police, but bills stuffed into the holes to show how the money was hidden. The gun, fully loaded, was discovered in a hole in the plank just to the left of the money. (Associated Press Photo)

FINGERPRINTS CALLED 'PRICELESS' IN LINDY CASE



As officials pushed their investigation of the Lindbergh baby kidnaping case, one investigator termed Bruno Hauptmann's fingerprints "the one priceless piece of evidence." Four of the suspect's righthand prints are shown at top. Below are shown two of the peculiar interlocking symbols which appeared on all the Lindbergh ransom notes. These likewise were expected to play a significant part in the case as it progressed. (Associated Press Photos)

JAFSIE'S DESCRIPTION OF SUSPECT



Months ago an artist retained by the department of justice, made these sketches of the man who received the \$50,000 ransom from Dr. J. F. Condon—"Jafsie" in the Lindbergh kidnaping case—using Dr. Condon's description as a "model." 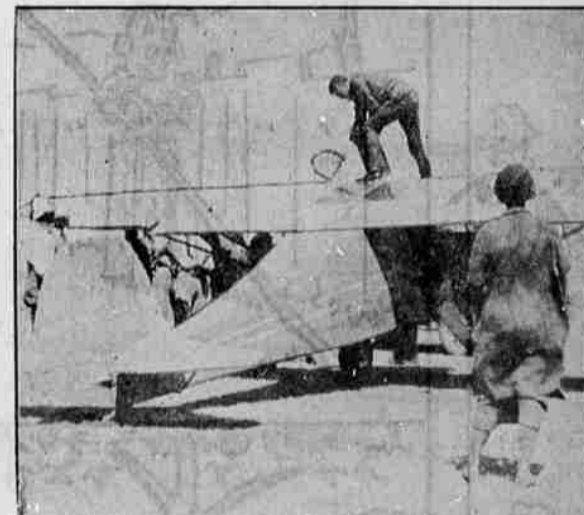

LINDY REFUELS NEAR TEXAS VILLAGE



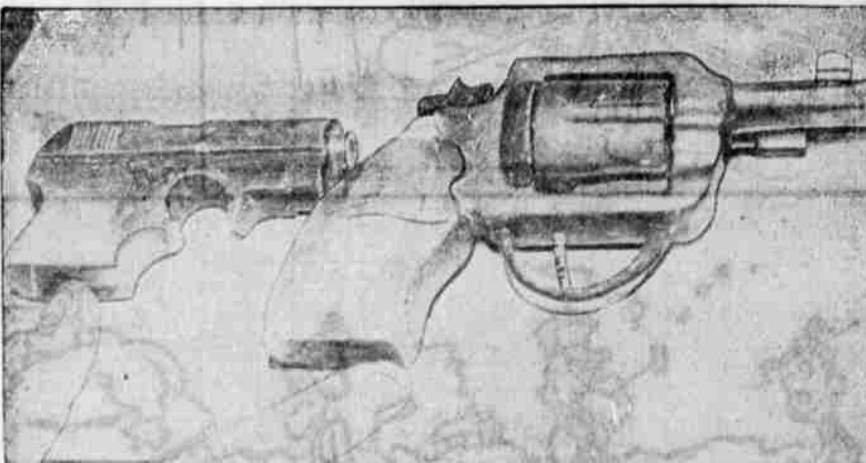

HELP TRACK DOWN LINDY SUSPECT



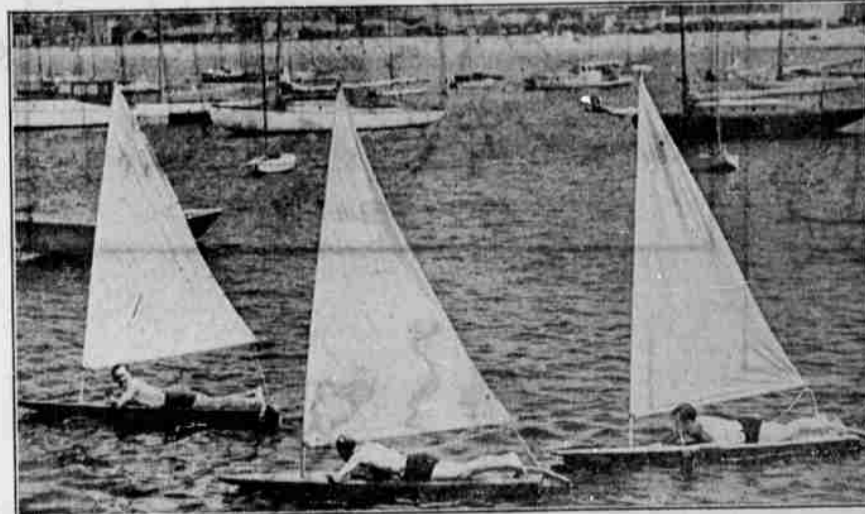
