PARENTS SCHOOL POSTPONED, DUE TO P.-T. A. CONFAB

Every family of Jackson county should be interested in the all day school for parents to be held in the courthouse auditorium, October 19. This school was scheduled for October 18, but because of the district conference of Parent-Teacher associations to be held in Grants Pass on

that date, the school for parents has been postponed to Friday, October 19.

Miss Flora Thurston, an educator of national prominence, will be the guest speaker at both morning and afternoon sessions. Miss Thurston until recently executive secretary of the National Council of Parent Education, New York City, has been recently added to the home economics staff at the Oregon State college for a period of one year as acting professor of child development and parent education to replace Mrs. Sara W. Prentiss who is on leave of absence.

Few people could lead such a school more ably than Miss Thurston, who has had wide experience in the field of parent education work, and was a member of the county and state extension staff of Cornell university,

New York, for several years. Miss Thurston is a graduate of Columbia university and recently was granted a two year fellowship at Columbia for child development research under the National Research Council. She is now working only part-time while completing this study for an advanced degree, Ph. D.

At the morning session beginning at 10 o'clock, Miss Thurston will speak on the subject "Exploring New Values in Family Life." In the afternoon her topic will be "Family Life—The New Cooperative." recreation in the home, table games and home play equipment, and PERA nursery school program will also be themes for discussion.

Parents, young people, teachers, parent-teacher groups and home extension units are invited and expected to

attend the sessions at 10 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. in the court house auditorium, October 19.
