

GODS WAY OF LIFE NOT MANS WAY, IS SHOWN BY PASTOR

"God's ways are at variance with sinful man's ways," said Fred M. Weatherford, pastor-evangelist in speaking at the Church of the Nazarene last night from the topic, "God's Ways and Man's."

Continuing the speaker said, "God's way of life is righteousness. Man's way is sin. God's way for man is to qualify him for heaven. The way of man unaided will terminate in God's punishment. Man's way of dealing with the liquor question is to poison the human race to balance its abstinence. Proverbs 20:1: 'Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; and whoever is deceived thereby is not wise.' 'God's greatest love for man and at the same time his greatest gift against sin, was the gift of his Son for his obliteration in human character.

"That man does not deserve an eternity of punishment for his sins, is the story of the prisoner at the court of justice. It is of more importance to know the decision of the judge in the case; who said, 'These shall go away into everlasting punishment; but the righteous into life eternal.'

"Of the thirty parables of Jesus in the New Testament, eleven bear directly or subordinally upon the teaching of rewards and punishments. It is admitted by our national administration that the underlying principle of our economic downfall is attributed to greed and the unethical business inter-relationship of men.

"To materialize a social transformation such as the New Deal seeks, will be impossible without changed hearts. The only way to successfully deal with the spirit of grasping greed, is to imbibe the Spirit of Christ. That spirit which lays down its life for others. It will require a national revival of the Christian religion, if we are to have that type of citizenry that will conserve the freedom of our democracy and save us from communistic servitude.

"Dr. E. Stanley Jones recently returned to India by way of Russia. He said, 'What I saw in Russia so deeply impressed me that I felt as never before, that this was the problem that we would have in the future. We must choose whether we are to have the pattern of Marx or the pattern of the kingdom of God. . . or to be compelled to take the Russian brand of communism.'

"Three young people responded to accept Christ at the conclusion of the service.
