Harry McMahon, president of the Rogue Valley Golf Club, forged into the semi-finals of the P. A. T. tournament Sunday by defeating R. B. Hammond one up and one to go. McMahon returned from an auto trip to San Francisco early Sunday morning. In time to take on Hammond for the crucial quarter-final match.
