

HUSKIES OFFENSE MAY END ANCIENT JINX OF OREGON

Washingtonians Determined
to Cross Goal Line of Web-
foots Team After Six
Years of Denied Hopes

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 9.—(SPL.)—One of the outstanding offensive battles of the season is on tap when the University of Oregon meets the University of Washington at Portland next Saturday, October 13. It will be the 29th Webfoot-Husky gridiron battle.

For six long years the Huskies have been unable to cross the Webfoot goal line. This year Jimmy Phelan has gathered one of the strongest squads to represent the Seattle school in many seasons. Washington is pointing for the Webfoots, openly and defiantly, with the main idea of crossing that elusive final white stripe.

Offense to Be Defense.
Faced with the problem of stopping Washington's dazzling array of backfield stars, the Webfoots seem to have just one way out—to score more touchdowns than the Huskies. That Oregon has an effective offense was forcefully demonstrated in last week's 26 to 9 victory over U. C. L. A.

Washington will depend on a large group of all-star ball carriers, classed as the finest aggregation of backs ever gathered in the Northwest. Five veterans and three brilliant sophomores give Coach Phelan two complete backfield combinations. One, all veterans, includes Jay Hornbeck, Art Abene, Earl Burdick and Paul "Rocky" Sullosky. The second will field Byron Haines, former Bend high star, Jimmie "Sugar" Cain, Matt Muczynski and big Ed Nowogrodski.

Prink Pickers Starters.
Prink Callahan, Oregon coach, will pin his hopes of victory on Ralph Terjeson, Bob Parke, John Reichman and driving Frank Michels as a starting combination. A second quartet shows Hugh McCredie, Maury Van Vleet, either Walter Back, Pepper Pepelnjak or Ray Lopez, and Dick Bishop, Michels, Van Vleet, Parke and McCredie were stars of the U. C. L. A. game.

The opposing lines will be about equal in both weight and experience. The Husky forward wall with Tony Burke, center, Chuck Mucha and Frank Windust, guards, big Chuck Bond and Captain Woody Ulin, tackles, and Trigg Hansen and Walt Bohrschell, ends, average close to 190 pounds. Mucha, Windust and Ulin are seasoned veterans and the rest sophomores and ex-reserves.

Oregon's line combination of Butch Moore, left end, Alex Eagle, left tackle; Roy Gagnon, left guard, Con Perry, center, Andy Hurney, right guard; Del Bjork, right tackle, and Budd Jones, right end, tallies around the 195 pound mark. Moore, co-captain of the Webfoots, and Eagle are the only vets.

A capacity crowd of more than 32,000 is expected to jam Multnomah stadium for the contest. Only a few reserved seats are still available.

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TIGER TITLE HOPE BLOOMS EARLY IN FOOTBALL SEASON

While in the Portland Intercollegiate league the football teams are finding their respective places in league standings with Jefferson high school on top, Medford seems to be stealing all the cake as far as a strong contender for the mythical state title is concerned.

It was in 1932 that a Medford high team journeyed to Portland to play a strong Jefferson team, the Jefferson team defeated Medford 35 to 0. This defeat is still a sore spot in the bosom of the Tiger players for there is quite a number of this year's Tigers that made that trip to Portland.

While it is almost too early to predict championship outfits, Medford appears to have a stronger team so far this season than they had last. The line is composed of men who have seen two or more seasons of football, and the backfield is likewise made up of players who have seen two or more seasons of football.

Medford is lead by Leo Ghelardi, midget quarterback, who was an understudy to Max Gillinsky, now playing with Gonzaga university. The position left open by Tommy White who last year was recognized as one of the leading quarterbacks and blocking backs in the state, is being handled by Blondie Lewis and signal barking is handled by Ghelardi.

After the game last Saturday with Roseburg, Medford fans seem to have forgotten Gillinsky and White. Gillinsky won such favor with the fans last year that it was said Medford would never find a boy that could step quite as fancy as he, but Ghelardi is showing the fans a little more than just fast stepping.

White won his fame, not by carrying the ball but by knocking down any would-be tackler who attempted to spoil the journey of the pigskin.

For a line Medford has some real men. Burdette Kindred, a tall, sandy haired youth with two years' experience and with a foot especially designed for punting, Ronald Baker, signed for punting, and Ghelardi, a stocky youth also with two years' experience who along with Kindred has been forming the nucleus of defense and offense in the Medford line.

Coach D. K. Burgher, however, is silent as to championship hopes. His team has the two biggest games of the season yet to come—Klamath Falls and the Chemawa Indians. Klamath seems to have the weakest team of its history but that was the story they peddled last year and all the years in the past. Last year Medford journeyed to Klamath and barely beat the Pelicans, 7 to 6. Grants Pass may give Medford a surprise.

This season's battle for the Southern Oregon league title seems to be somewhat of a horse-race at this date. Medford has the lead on paper, but much can happen.
