

ORR PURCHASES WEEKS SHARE IN FURNITURE STORE

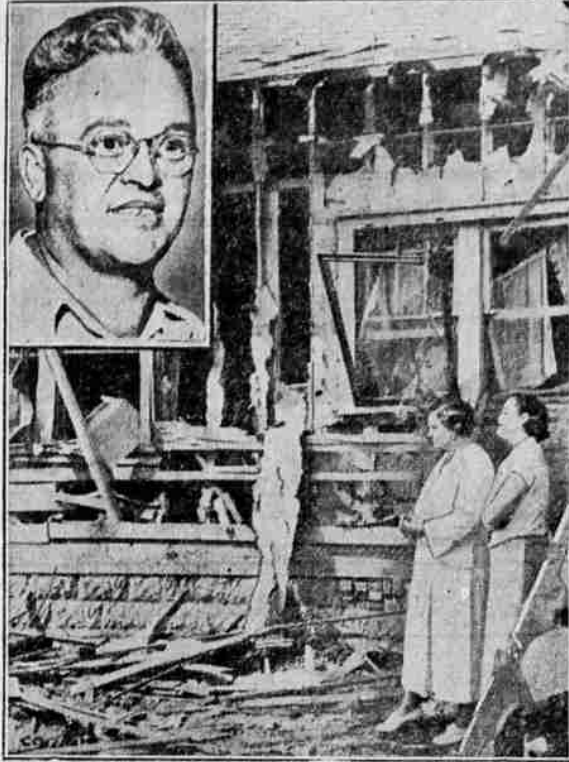
In one of the most important business transactions of recent months A. E. Orr, pioneer Medford business man, purchased the interest of Mrs. Mae Weeks in Weeks & Orr's Furniture store and became sole owner of that well known Medford concern yesterday. Mr. Orr has had active management of the large store for some time, under the new set-up of full ownership, the progressive establishment will launch other expansion movements from time to time.

Albert E. Orr came to Medford 27 years ago and entered the employment of the firm he now owns, then operating as Weeks & McGowan. Soon after becoming associated with this pioneer firm, Orr purchased an interest and has since steadily added to his holdings. He is also active in fruit raising and has been prominent in business and fraternal circles of this city.

During his recent business activities, Mr. Orr has been active in state and coast furniture organizations and has served as president of the Oregon State Retail Furniture dealers association and vice-president of the Western Retail Furniture dealers organization, covering 11 western states. ONE ASSAILANT KILLED ON SPOT, SECOND NABBED

Alexander had been greeted on his procession through the city by cheering throngs.

He was riding in the first automobile of the procession past the Stock Exchange when the shots cracked out. His car was riddled by shots and was the only automobile to be hit.

Surgeons' Work Falls.

The dying king was taken at once to the prefecture, where surgeons began their emergency work in an effort to save his life, but their labors were in vain.

The assailant was described as a man of about 40 years.

Almost as soon as the shots were fired, the French government clamped a tight censorship upon dispatches regarding the tragedy. The censorship lasted 40 minutes, but the news stories already had been sent abroad and the ban on the news was lifted.

All three of the shots which wounded him struck Alexander in the chest. Death came in an hour.

Turmoil Reigns.

All the street was thrown into turmoil, making immediate identification of the participants difficult, but when a semblance of order had been restored, it appeared that there were two assassins.

One of them, not immediately identified, was shot and killed by the police as he attempted to escape. The other was Petris Kaleman, 35, a Yugoslav who had been born in Zagreb. He was wounded by the flash of a police sabre.

Several persons in the crowd grouped around the king's automobile also were wounded, apparently by the fusillade of assassins' bullets.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. — (AP) — NRA's rebirth probably will find the government seeing stricter policing of those whom Hugh S. Johnson used to call chiselers.

The question of code compliance ranks high in the list of problems presented to President Roosevelt by his new national industrial recovery board.

It matches price-fixing and production control as an issue to which the board and the president will give much thought as they gradually re-empower the recovery unit's policies.

The new board, headed by S. Clay Williams, is said to believe in more compliance with the provisions of the codes.
