DOG SLAIN WHEN CHICKENS RAIDED IS SUIT ANSWER

Label Stevens, Alice Garle and F. E. Garle, sued last week by Gertrude Ottinger for \$1500, for the alleged slaying of an Australian shepherd dog, filed answer today in circuit court. Plaintiff holds the dog was worth \$1000, because of its ability to make itself useful around the Jackson Hot Springs, due to long training. Five hundred dollars punitive damages are sought.

The answer sets forth that the Garles are operators of a poultry farm in the Valley View district. It is admitted that Stevens shot the dog, upon the orders of Mrs. Garle, and that F. E. Garle, the husband, knew nothing about it. The slaying of the dog occurred, the answer cites, "in the protection of property, and after the limit of patience had been exhausted."

It is further set forth that the Garles and Stevens had made an effort to catch the Ottinger dog and impound him, but he was too elusive. Two dogs that accompanied the Ottinger dog on alleged chickenhouse raids, also got away. Following the loss of 22 chickens in a week, a watch was kept upon the chickenhouse, and when three dogs appeared, Stevens killed two, including the Ottinger dog, while the third escaped.

The defendants denied they slew with malice or wantonness, but simply in protection of property and sole means of livelihood. They also asserted that the Ottinger dog "is not worth \$1000 or any sum whatsoever." In a counter claim, the defendants ask \$37.50—the value of the destroyed pullets, and that the costs of the action be assessed to the plaintiffs.
