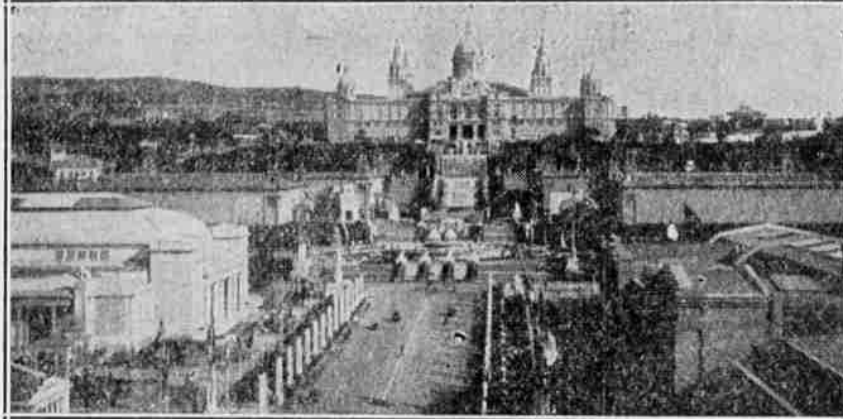

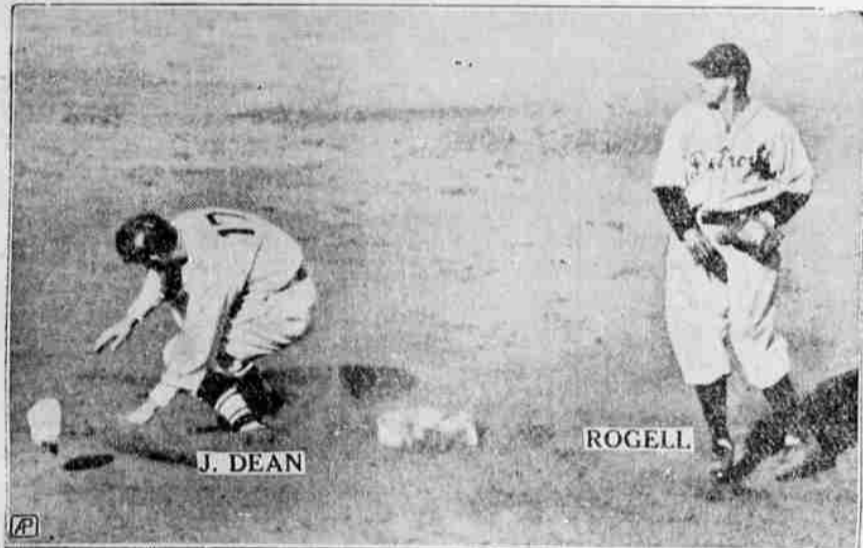

Vanderbilt Trial Calls Marchioness

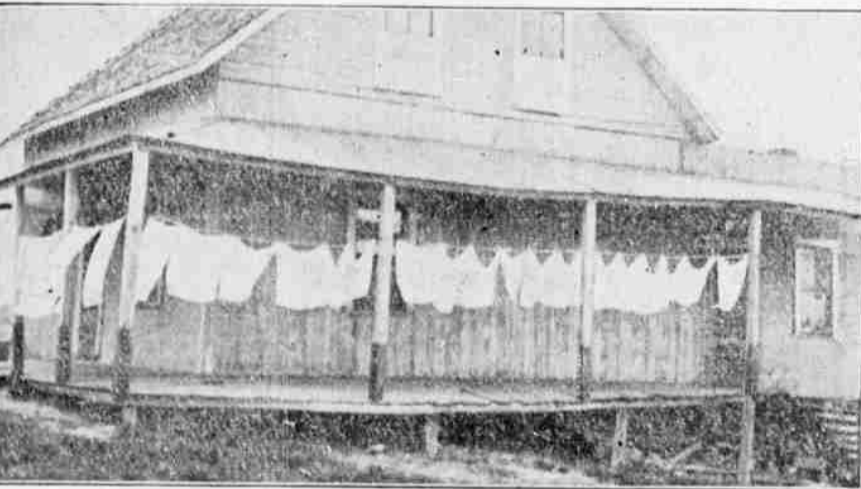
