

PERIL TO PUBLIC HEALTH SEEN IN HEALING ART BILL

Vital Importance of Defeating Proposed Amendment to State Laws Stressed by Hospital Standard Officer

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11.—(Sp.)—"With one of Oregon's most prized possessions — her high standards of public health—endangered, citizens are awakening to the vital importance of defeating the healing arts constitutional amendment, which comes before the voters in the November election."

So declared the Rev. Axel M. Green, secretary of the committee for preservation of Oregon's hospital standards and workmen's compensation law, speaking before a group of representative business, professional and club leaders today. The volunteer workers had assembled to launch a vigorous campaign of education to acquaint the public with the revolutionary character of the proposed constitutional amendment.

Holds Three-Way Threat. "If passed, this amendment, which is sponsored wholly by self-seeking interests," said Rev. Green, "would jeopardize our present workmen's compensation law; nullify the basic science law, which protects our citizens against the charlatan and the quack; and lower the high hospital standards which have won national recognition for Oregon."

"This healing arts amendment seeks to take away from our higher board of education the right to examine applicants for licenses to practice medicine, chiropractic, naturopathic or other branches of the healing arts, and give that right over to boards made up of members of the respective groups. In effect it completely nullifies our basic science law, which provides that persons seeking licenses to practice any form of healing, except healing by prayer or spiritual means, must prove to persons competent to judge that they know the fundamentals of anatomy, physiology, chemistry and hygiene.

Protect the Sick. "Surely the sick and suffering are entitled to that much protection—the protection of knowing that the persons who take their money and promise to help them, know something about the human body and the common laws of health."

Failure to defeat the proposed healing arts amendment will set health standards in Oregon back 50 years, in the opinion of the civic leaders who are waging the campaign against its passage.

A provision of the amendment which compels hospitals to permit any doctor, however incompetent, to treat serious cases of illness, perform surgery, care for contagious diseases and attend mothers in childbirth, is held to be particularly dangerous and vicious by those opposing the amendment.

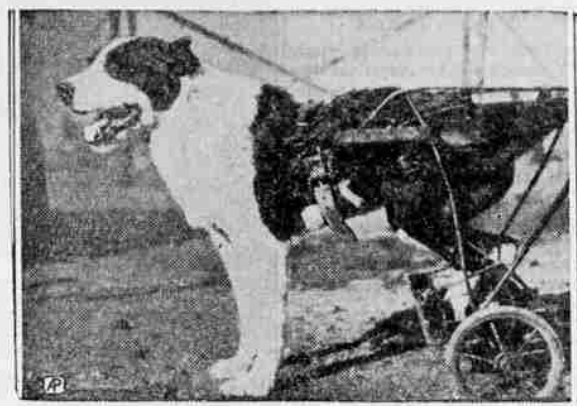
Under present laws, which require hospitals to select competent staff doctors and to maintain high standards of practice, Oregon has attained a high place among states of the union with respect to public health and has one of the lowest infant mortality rates in the entire country.

No least of the evils charged against the proposed healing arts constitutional amendment by those who oppose it is the belief of many industrial, business and organization leaders that it would completely wreck Oregon's workmen's compensation act.

Would Drop Bars. The splendid success of this law, as administered by the industrial accident commission, is attributed by observers to the excellent hospital and medical facilities that have been made available to injured workers. Through a high standard of treatment, workers have been restored in a majority of cases to health and a self-sustaining basis. Thus, the cost to employers has been held within reasonable limits.

But let down the bars, make it possible for unsuspecting workers to fall prey to "diploma-mill" doctors, interested solely in private gain, and become patients of sub-standard hospitals, and costs will become so great as to undermine and wreck the entire

Dog, 'Too Good to Be Killed', Gets Wheel Chair After Injury



AMHERST, Tex.—(AP)—Barney, 5-year-old dog hero of this town, paralyzed in the haunches when run over by a motorcar, now can travel in a "wheel chair" in which he now can travel at 20 miles an hour.

"He was just too good a dog to be killed when he was crippled," said A. M. Brown, Barney's owner, "so I made him a wheel chair."

The chair consists of a platform on coater wagon wheels, with braces strapped to the dog just behind his front legs. The incapacitated hind legs, with most of the animal's weight removed from them by the straps, rest on the platform.

Barney became the town's hero when, making the rounds with the nightwatchman, he recaptured one of two men the officer had arrested after the suspect had made a break for freedom.

Federal Agents on Job. Taciturn department of justice men directing their work, city and county officers joined two state police forces in weaving a band about this area, hoping to trap the man and his victim.

He "looked around with the wires, she said, and then ripped away the connection. Mrs. Stoll, who had been ill several days, came down stairs when she heard the noise.

The man menaced Mrs. Wooley with a gun, forced her to tape the hands of her mistress. Then he tied the maid to a chair, gagged her and told Mrs. Stoll he was going to kidnap her.

They talked about it for some time. Mrs. Stoll offered the man a check if he would let her go. He replied by hitting her on the head with a piece of iron pipe. Her head was cut and began to bleed, but the maid said she was not unconscious.

Allowing her a checked blue and white coat to cover her negligence, the kidnaper then forced his victim to go with him. Mrs. Wooley caught a glimpse of his car, a late model coach or sedan (Ford V-8, '33 or '34). He said: "If Berry comes, I'll kill him," the maid declared.

The man was in the house about an hour and a half in all. The two women were alone.

The kidnaping was discovered by Stoll when he went home at 5:30 last night. He telephoned police from a neighbor's home.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The bodies of four of five persons listed as victims of small boat disasters were sought at northern California coast points today.

Three of the missing, Fred Swanson of Portland, Ore., and Fred Johnson and Verne Clark of Eureka, were believed to have perished when their fishing boat, the Crescent, was wrecked by heavy seas. The wreck was washed ashore near Eureka yesterday.

No trace had been found of the body of Lewis Durkee, 45, of Alameda, drowned when the tug, Valiant, was rammed by the schooner, Lumberman, in Oakland estuary. The body of a woman victim of the accident, Marian E. Kent, 43, Alameda, was recovered.
